It's that time of year again...

time to remind everyone that Fireworks are prohibited in the City of North Little Rock

North Little Rock Ordinance No. 7327, adopted December 11, 2000 includes the following:

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING ORDINANCE NO. 7167 AND ORDINANCE NO. 6175 OF THE CODE OF ORDINANCES OF THE CITY OF NORTH LITTLE ROCK; DECLARING AN EMERGENCY; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES.

SECTION 1: That Section 1 of Ordinance No. 7167, amending Ordinance No. 6175, is hereby amended by the following:

(d) Page 195, §2002.2 shall be amended to read:

Except as hereinafter provided it shall be **unlawful for any person to possess, store, offer for sale, sell at retail, set off, ignite or otherwise explode and fireworks or other fireworks by whatever name called within the city limits**; provided that the use of fireworks for public displays shall be allowed upon recommendation by the fire marshal and authorization of the City Council, only after all provisions of NfiPa 1123 are met and all necessary permits have been issued. Every such use or display shall be handled by a competent operator approved by the fire marshal and shall be of such character and so located, discharged or fired so as not to be hazardous to property or endanger any person.

No parent or guardian of a minor shall furnish money or a thing of value to a minor for the purchase of fireworks or encourage, act in conjunction with or in any manner instigate or aid a minor in the commission of having, keeping, storing, selling, offering for sale, giving away, using, transporting or manufacturing fireworks within the corporate limits of the city. The violation of this section shall be an offense regardless of whether or not the minor shall be charged or found guilty of the offense. The commission of the offense by the minor on the property under the control or owned by the parent or guardian shall be prima facie proved that the parent or guardian aided the minor.

The fine or penalty for violating this provision, upon conviction in municipal court, shall be not less than twenty-five and 00/100 dollars (\$25.00) nor more than five hundred and 00/100 dollars (\$500.00).

The City of North Little Rock wants all of our residents and visitors to be safe and enjoy the upcoming 4th of July holiday.

Please keep the following in mind:

- **Fireworks can be dangerous**, causing serious burns and eye injuries.
- **Persons with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder**—and loud or sudden noise can be a trigger for PTSD. This can cause an involuntary episode of flashbacks, uncontrollable shaking, sweating, panic attacks, heart palpitations or other emotional symptoms.
- **Fireworks and pets**—pets are more sensitive to loud noises, flashing lights and strong smells. On the 4th of July, and other days people are likely to set off fireworks, it's best to leave your pets safely indoors, preferable with a radio or TV turned on to soften jarring sounds.

Well it is summer time. The fourth of July is right around the corner. That means grilling out and watching fireworks. Have fun but be safe doing it. Here are a few tips to help keep you safe as you enjoy the summer.

Keep your BBQ grill clean. Grease fires often occur when grilling. These can grow quickly extending fire to everything nearby. Propane and charcoal BBQ grills should never be used indoors or too close to combustible material. Keep your grill safely away from your house, vehicles and fences. Just the heat from a BBQ grill can damage vinyl siding or paint and molded plastic. Maintain a clearance of several feet around the grill. Children and pets can easily run into a grill turning it over. Keep a watch out for this. Never leave your grill unattended. The hot coals from a charcoal grill can start a fire if placed near combustible material. Never put hot coals in a combustible trash container.



According to the National Fire Protection Association, fireworks start over 19,000 fires and send over 9,000 people to the Emergency Room each year in the US. Because of the potential for causing injuries, fires and property damage, the possession or use of fireworks are prohibited within the city limits of NLR. Fireworks displays are allowed by licensed and insured technicians with permits for the displays. Let the pros handle the fireworks, just enjoy the show.

Mayor Terry C. Hartwick holds a monthly department head meeting. Department heads provide a report of activities, projects and accomplishments.

Below are highlights from May 2022 (You will see that some departments had to change operations due to the Coronavirus/COVID-19.

Hays Center—fully open to members. 6,957 members visited, with an average 362 members per day. 111 new members. Volunteers contributed 637 hours.

Sanitation—crews continue to pickup garbage and yard waste during the pandemic. Garbage / Yard Waste crews collected 2,122.52 tons (4,245.04 lbs) of household garbage, rubbish and junk. Yard waste crews collected 87 loads (2,421.80 cubic yards) of green waste. 288 tires picked up. 30 Sanitation Code inspections and 20 re-inspections. Issued 18 notices for non-compliance. Collected \$780.00 from move-outs or excessive bulk waste. Curbside recycling tonnage for the month was 155.49.

Traffic—AR One Call requests—70, Signs/posts repaired or replaced—320, City vehicles marked with decals—16. Set up Speed Trailer on Kierre Drive and Lynch and Saunders. Stealth box on Nicole.

Police—Property crimes rose slightly—majority were vehicle break-ins—over 1/3 involved unlocked vehicles. Lieutenant Mark Tubbs was promoted to Captain. Sergeant Matt Anderson was promoted to Lieutenant. Currently have 173 officers. 4 certified officers scheduled to start in June. Interested in becoming a NLR Police Officer? Fire—Total incidents—963, Fires—40 False alarms—62, Rescue/Emergency Medical—573, Hazmat—35. Training hours: 1,890. Building surveys: 193.

Emergency/911—Incoming calls—12,149, Non-911—4,261, Wired 911—901, Abandoned 911—37, Wireless 911—6,353, Abandoned Wireless—237. Total dispatch entries: 8,147.

Planning—Inspectors traveled 3,986 miles within the city performing the following inspections: 122 HVAC, 244 Plumbing, 287 Electrical, 220 Building. Issued the following permits: 5 sign, 10 demolition, 24 New Single Family (average cost \$225,836), 48 Residential Remodel (average cost \$14,156), 1 New Commercial (permit \$3,112,460, 9 Commercial Remodel (average cost \$763,556), 1 new Multi-family.

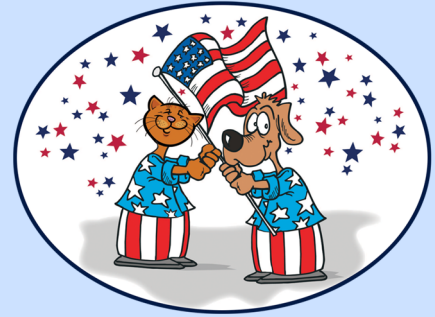

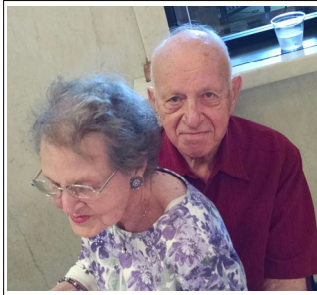

Frederick L. “Buddy Morgan, 95, passed away May 19, 2022.

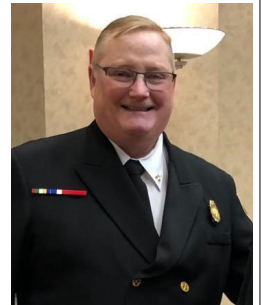

Esophageal Cancer

Esophageal cancer forms inside the esophagus, which is the muscular tube that carries food from the mouth to the stomach. Esophageal cancer is not as common as some other cancers, such as breast, lung, and prostate cancer. But the number of people with one particular type of esophageal cancer, called adenocarcinoma, has risen dramatically in the past few decades. Adenocarcinoma is the most common type of esophageal cancer in the U.S. Let's talk about more about it, including what symptoms you should be aware of.

What causes esophageal cancer?

Unfortunately, we don't know exactly what causes esophageal cancer. It is thought that chronic irritation of the inner lining of the esophagus may contribute to causing changes in cells within the esophagus that can make them grow and divide out of control.

Here are some of the things that cause irritation in the cells of the esophagus that appear to increase your risk of developing esophageal cancer:

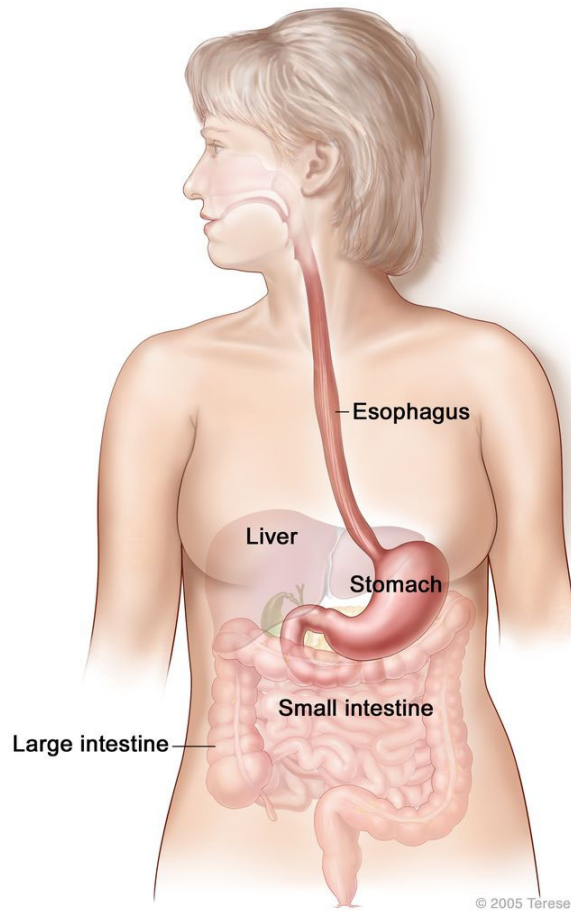
- Smoking
- Having gastroesophageal reflux disease (GERD)
- Drinking alcohol
- Having Barrett's esophagus, which is the name given to precancerous changes in the esophagus
- Being obese
- A steady habit of drinking very hot liquids
- Not eating enough fruits and vegetables
- Having bile reflux (reflux of bile from the gall bladder)
- Having an esophageal sphincter that won't relax (called achalasia), which usually cause trouble swallowing
- A history of radiation treatment to the chest or upper abdomen

What are the symptoms of esophageal cancer?

- Weight loss without trying
- Difficulty swallowing
- Progressively worsening heartburn or indigestion
- Coughing or hoarseness
- Chest pain or pressure, or a burning sensation in the chest.

How is the diagnosis of esophageal cancer made?

- Barium swallow test - You swallow a liquid containing barium, then have X-rays. The barium will show the contour of your esophagus on the X-ray.
- Endoscopy or EGD - This involves your doctor putting a flexible lighted tube through your mouth and throat, into your esophagus. During the EGD, a biopsy can be done of any suspicious areas to send to the lab for testing.

- CT scan of the chest - Can show the tissues in the esophagus.

What can you do to help reduce your risk of esophageal cancer?

- If you have been told that you have Barrett's esophagus, be sure to maintain follow up with your doctor and undergo screening tests when recommended.
- Quit smoking
- Avoid alcohol consumption or drink only in moderation
- Maintain a healthy weight. If you are overweight, talk with your doctor or one of our dieticians about strategies to help you lose weight.
- Eat more fruits and vegetables, aiming for a variety of colors.
- If you have GERD, follow your doctor's recommendations regarding treatment as well as lifestyle precautions you should take.

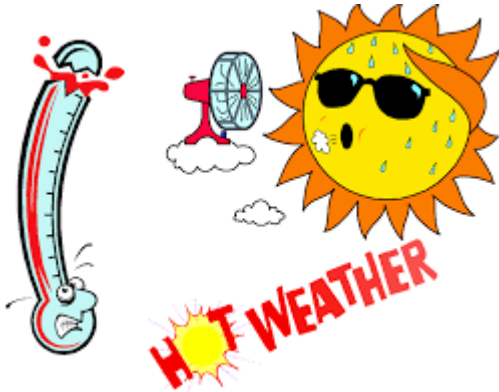

Avoid Heat Illness



When it is hot outside, your body temperature can rise to dangerous levels. Normally, your body cools itself through sweating. However, in hot and humid weather,

sweating is not enough and the result can be a heat illness.

Staying Cool

Follow the suggestions below to stay cool when working in hot weather:

- Wear loose, light-colored clothing and some type of hat.
- Adapt to working in hot conditions gradually, especially if performing strenuous tasks.
- Take breaks in the shade when possible, and remove any outer protective gear you may be wearing.
- Avoid overexerting yourself during peak temperature periods (midday).
- Drink liquids frequently, even if you don't feel thirsty—at least eight ounces every 20 to 30 minutes. Choose water, fruit juice or sports drinks and stay away from liquids containing caffeine, which can dehydrate you.

Recognizing the Symptoms

There are three forms of heat illness, each with its own distinct symptoms:

- Heat Cramps—severe muscle spasms in the back, stomach, arms and legs, which are attributed to the loss of body salt and water during periods of heavy perspiration.
- Heat Exhaustion—heavy sweating, cool or pale skin, nausea, headache, weakness, vomiting and fast pulse.
- Heat Stroke—high body temperature, sweating stops, red and often dry skin, rapid breathing and pulse, headache, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea, seizures, confusion or unconsciousness.

Providing Treatment

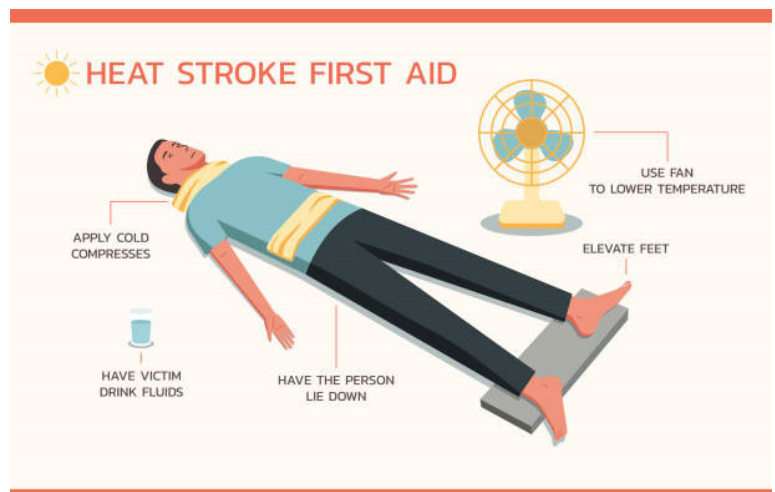
It is essential to treat heat illness as soon as possible. If you are feeling any of the above symptoms,

inform a co-worker and ask for help. If you suspect that a fellow worker has any of these conditions, follow the first-aid suggestions below:

- Heat Cramps—move the victim to a cooler area and provide them with water or other cool, nonalcoholic beverages. Follow up with a medical examination.
- Heat Exhaustion—move the victim to a cooler area and keep them lying down with their legs slightly elevated. Cool their body by fanning and applying cool wet towels. Have them drink approximately six ounces of water every 15 minutes. Follow up with a medical examination.
- Heat Stroke—you or a bystander should immediately call an ambulance. Meanwhile, move the victim to a cooler area, remove outer clothing, immerse them in cool water or apply cool, wet towels or cloths to the body. If the person is awake and able to swallow, give them small amounts of cool water to drink. If medical help is delayed, call the hospital for further instructions while waiting. Heat stroke is life-threatening, so it's important to move quickly!

Safety Reminder

The risk of heat illness increases with age, poor diet, being overweight, insufficient liquid intake, poor physical condition and/or when taking medication. Never take salt tablets without your doctor's approval. Be aware of weather conditions when you will be working outside so that you can be prepared with appropriate clothing and beverages. If you are working outside and start to feel any adverse symptoms, inform someone and take a break.



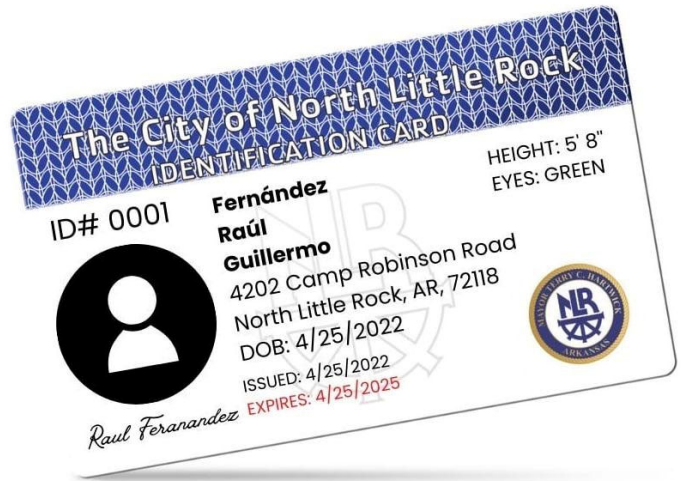
City of North Little Rock Municipal Identification Program

The City of North Little Rock recently announced a partnership with the non-profit Seis Puentes/Butterfly Ministries to develop and implement a Municipal Identification (ID) Program in our city.

“Our City has placed their belief and support in Seis Puentes to partner on this much needed service.” said Mayor Terry C. Hartwick. Raul Fernandez, Executive Director of Seis Puentes said “The relationships Seis Puentes has developed within the immigrant community of Central Arkansas through education and information, and creating connections and opportunities for Latino/Hispanic communities in Arkansas continues to prosper.”

In addition to the immigrant community, this program will also benefit the elderly, homeless and others who lack any form of ID in our city. People need ID to obtain common things like utilities or to open a bank account.

History of Seis Puentes

Seis Puentes is a project of Butterfly Community, a registered 501 (c)3 organization. Butterfly Community began in 2001 with the help of former North Little Rock Mayor Patrick Henry Hays.

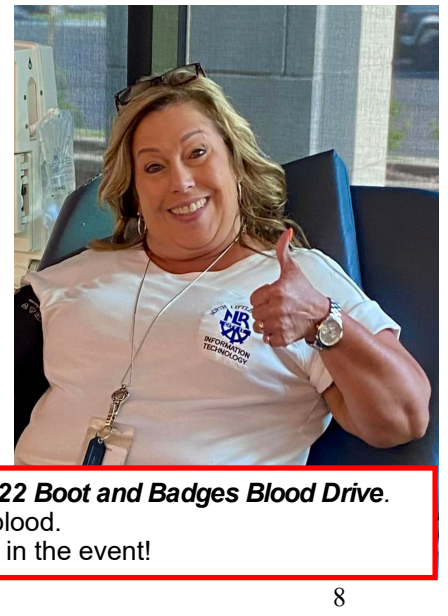
The Pulaski County Council for Children and Youth Services (PCCCYs) started a series of after school sites to serve as safe havens for youth and children who were at risk of becoming involved with gangs, violence, crime and substance abuse.

Butterfly Community supports two Our Club sites in North Little Rock operated by Leifel Jackson, reformed leader of the original Gangster Crips. He now nurtures and mentors at-risk youth. One of these clubs was in the old Argenta Train Station in Sherman Park. The second was in Silver City Courts. Both clubs ministered to elementary, middle and high school students in the afternoon by providing nutritious meals and snacks, tutoring, school supplies and school uniforms.

In 2002, Mayor Hays approached Butterfly Community for support of programs within the city's growing Hispanic communities. In response, Butterfly Ministry began Volar (Take Flight), an empowerment dance program for young girls between the ages of 6 and 16. They also organized the PROM program to redistribute beautiful formal wear to hundreds of prom-hopeful girls.

In 2012, Butterfly Community launched its new Outreach project and opened the Education and Resource Center on Camp Robinson Road. The center is fully equipped with computer work stations, printers, and projection equipment for classes, seminars and workshops.

The Seis Puentes Education and Resource Center partners with various strategic partners and also offers Adult Education classes including GED, WAGE, ESL, basic computer skills, job training and distance learning. Hispanic outreach includes information seminars, a youth dance program for students (ages 2 to 18), art workshops, and cultural enrichment opportunities.



This month employees from multiple city departments supported the annual **2022 Boot and Badges Blood Drive**. The Arkansas Blood Institute collected 83 units of blood. North Little Rock Police and Fire thank all who participated in the event!

Riding Lawnmower Safety

Riding Lawnmower Safety

Of all the machinery and equipment you work with, riding lawnmowers are one of the most hazardous, mostly due to sheer size and power. Namely, you face cutting or amputation hazards, rollover hazards and danger from flying debris. In order to stay safe and avoid injury while operating a riding lawnmower, follow these precautions.

General Precautions

- Read the instruction manual and receive the proper training before operating the machinery.
- Inspect the equipment before use for any damaged or missing parts.
- Ensure that the grass catcher, discharge guard and other safety devices are in working order and in their property position.
- Before use, clear the desired mowing area of debris, rocks, large branches, lawn furniture and other obstacles.
- With the engine off, adjust the deck's cutting height.
- Fill the gas tank in an open space to avoid fume inhalation.



- Never carry passengers on the mower with you or let any unauthorized persons operate the machine.
- Wear tight-fitting long pants, eye protection, ear protection, non-slip boots and gloves to protect your body against flying debris.
- Do not wear hanging jewelry, belts, chains or anything else that could get caught in the moving parts.

*“Most riding lawnmower accidents occur on the slope of a lawn.
To prevent rollovers, mow up and down slopes; do not attempt to drive across them.”*



- Avoid driving in reverse, if possible.

Operating Safety

- Start the mower while in the driver's seat, not while standing next to the machine.
- Disengage the mower and transmission before starting.
- Engage the blades at the lowest engine setting first and then release the brake slowly.
- Mow in straight lines except when steering around objects such as trees and shrubs.
- Slow down significantly while turning.
- Never put your hands or feet near the rotating blades under the machine.
- Never dismount the mower while the blades are en-

Currently, we have NO permitted door to door solicitors.

All 2021 North Little Rock Business/Privilege License/Permits are now delinquent and subject to a 50% penalty.

All persons doing business ***of any kind*** within the city limits of North Little Rock are required to have a Business/Privilege License. This includes home-based such as lawn care or internet sales.

*****If a business operates 1 day into the new year, it is required to obtain a business license at the full fee.*****

Currently there are **NO licensed or permitted door-to-door solicitors/peddlers in North Little Rock.** If you are a resident and someone comes to your door between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday, please call the North Little Rock City Clerk's Office at 501-975-8617. The North Little Rock City Clerk's Office will search the business name and the individual's name who is at your door. If it is after business hours or on the weekend, please call the North Little Rock Police Department at 501-758-1234. You will need to provide the time, location, description of individual and the name of the company or product they are trying to sale to either the Clerk's Office or NLRPD. If someone is at your door and behaving in an aggressive way, please call 911.

When doing business with anyone, take the time to check to see if they have the required **local (city) and state licenses.** Also, make sure anyone working on your property is **licensed and insured.** This is to protect you and your property in the event of a dispute or damage. Finally, check for an **insurance bond** and the amount. This will be important if there is damage, or if the vendor is injured while working on your property.

Door-to-Door Solicitation/Peddler. Anyone going door-to-door in North Little Rock for the purpose of providing a product or service (examples: alarm sales, lawn care, tree trimming, pest control, solar panels, books, etc.) is required to have an individual door-to-door peddlers permit issued by the City Clerk's Office. An application must be completed by each individual solicitor. The company the individual is representing is also required to have a city business license. Once all documents are provided, the packet will be sent to the North Little Rock Police Chief for final approval.

An issued door-to-door permit/license is good for 90 days from the date of issue. The applicant will be provided a city issued photo ID. The ID will also be posted to the City Clerk's page on the city's website. Example upper left.

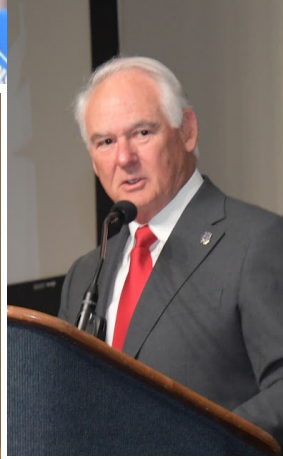
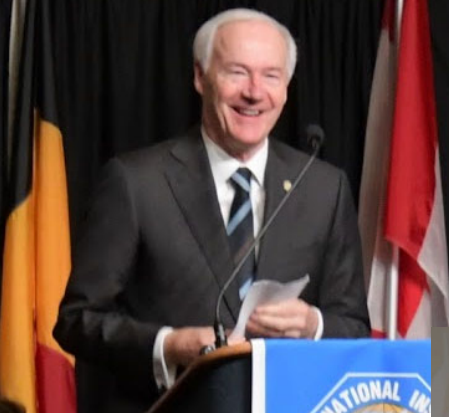

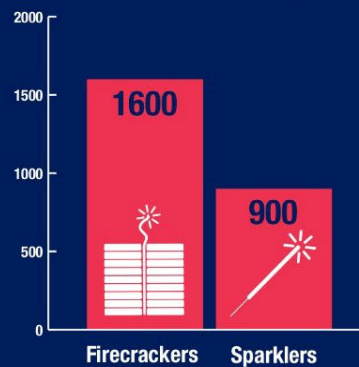

Injuries by Firework Type



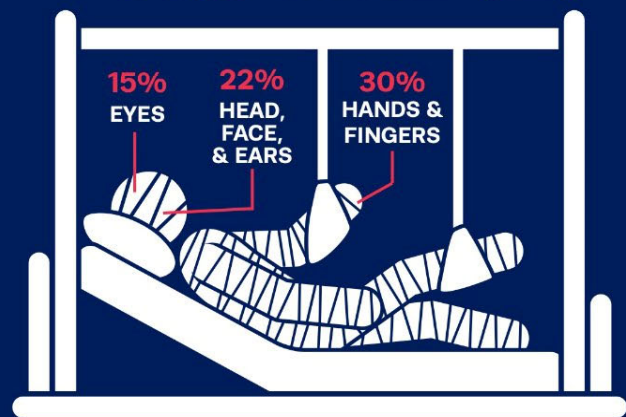

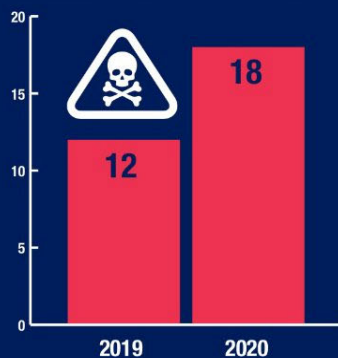
