Fall is in the air...

The Autumnal equinox—also called the September equinox—is the astronomical start of fall in the Northern Hemisphere and spring in the Southern Hemisphere.

The work equinox comes from the Latin aequus (equal) and nox (night).

During the equinox, the Sun crosses what we call the "celestial equator" (just imagine the line that marks the equator on Earth extending up into the sky) from north to south.

Earth's two hemispheres are receiving the Sun's rays about equally. The Sun is overhead at noon as seen from the equator. At this point, the amount of nighttime and daytime (sunlight) are roughly equal to each other.

Another definition of fall is nights of below-freezing temperatures combined with days of temperatures below 70 degrees Fahrenheit. From here on out, the temperatures begin to drop and the days start to get shorter than the nights.

It is the summer's great last heat, it is the fall's first chill: they meet.—Sarah Morgan Bryan Piatt Why aren't days and nights equal?

Nights and days actually aren't perfectly equal on the equinox, as in 12 hours of daylight and 12 hours of nighttime. The split may be off by a few minutes. Why does this happen?

It depends on where you live. On the autumnal and vernal equinoxes, the very center of the Sun sets 12 hours after it rises. But the day begins when the upper edge of the Sun reaches the horizon (which happens a bit before the center rises), and it doesn't end until the entire sun has set. Not only that, but the Sun is actually visible when it is below the horizon, as Earth's atmosphere refracts the Sun's rays and bends them in an arc over the horizon.

According to former Almanac astronomer, George Greenstein, "If the Sun were to shrink to a star-like point and we lived in a world without air, the spring and fall equinoxes would truly have 'equal nights."

What falling leaves indicate

There's an old weather proverb that states, "If autumn leaves are slow to fall, prepare for a cold winter." This means that leaves that hang onto the tree indicate a colder winter is to come. Or, perhaps you just haven't had enough windy days! But look on the bright side—you get to look at the beautiful autumn foliage for a little bit longer.

Signs of Fall

In many regions of North America, the landscape silently explodes with vibrant colors of red, yellow, and orange. The leaves begin to drop off the trees, providing endless hours of jumping into leaf piles for kids and raking them back up for parents!

Plants and trees are slowing down, as sunlight decreases, However, in the garden, asters and chrysanthemums bloom beautifully as orange pumpkins and corn mazes abound. Baseball season hits the homestretch, while football season is just warming up.

Halloween and Thanksgiving carry us through the season until temperatures begin to drop, nights begin to get longer, and all the woodland critters start storing up for the long haul of winter.

Of course, you can easily notice the later dawns and earlier sunsets.

Also, notice the arc of the sun across the sky each day as it starts shifting south. Birds and butterflies migrate along with the path of our Sun.

Autumn Safety Tips for Pets

There's nothing like the crisp, cool air and luscious foliage to get you excited for the changing seasons. Your pet, too, is probably welcoming a break from summer's hot, sticky weather. But fall is also a time of lurking dangers for our furry friends. From household poisons to cold weather hazards, there are important safety issues to consider.

Below are some tips to keep your pet happy and healthy during the



autumn months.

Be Cautious of Rodenticides and Cold Weather Poisons. The use of rat and mouse poisons increase in the fall as rodents seek shelter from the cooler temperatures by attempting to move indoors. Ro-

er temperatures by attempting to move indoors. Rodenticides are highly toxic to pets and, if ingested, the results could be fatal. If



results could be fatal. If you must use these products, please do so with extreme caution and put them in places inaccessible to your pets.

Many people choose fall as the time to change their car's engine coolant. Ethylene glycol-based coolants are highly toxic, so spills should be cleaned up immediately. Consider switching to propylene glycol-based coolants—though they aren't completely non-



toxic, they are much less toxic than other engine coolants.

Keep School Supplies Out of Paws' Reach. Fall is back-to-school time, and those of you with young children know that means stocking up on items like glue sticks, pencils and magic markers. Although these items are considered low toxicity to pets, gastrointestinal upset and blockages can occur if ingested. Be sure your children keep their school supplies out of your pet's reach.

Steer Clear of Mushrooms. Fall and spring are mushroom seasons. While 99% of mushrooms have little or no toxicity, the 1% that are highly toxic can cause life-threatening problems in pets. Since most toxic mushrooms are difficult to distinguish from nontoxic ones, the best way to prevent pets from ingesting these poisonous plants is to keep them away from areas where any mushrooms are growing. Contact your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center at 888-426-4435 immediately if you witness your pet eating a wild mushroom.

Watch Out for Wildlife.

Autumn is the season when snakes are preparing for hibernation, increasing the possibility of bites to those unlucky pets who find themselves in the wrong place at the wrong time. Pet parents should know what kinds

of venomous snakes may be lurking in their environment—and where those snakes are most likely to be found—so pets can be kept out of those areas.

HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW THE NLR FIRE DEPARTMENT?

When most people think of the fire department, they think of the red fire truck with the lights and spraying water from a hose or the firemen washing the truck. But when the fire department is called, the person in need wants them to be an expert in whatever area they need help. This may be a medical emergency, traumatic injury, vehicle accident, vehicle fire, structure fire, hazardous materials response, technical rope rescue, boat rescue or a myriad of other emergencies that occur every day. Each emergency is a different situation with different people involved. Our citizens expect trained, highly motivated, caring professionals to respond to their emergency. They expect perfection and so do we.

NLR Fire Department personnel go through a rigorous hiring and training process. It starts with a written test administered by the NLR Human Resources Department. If this test is passed, it is on to the Physical Ability Test which tests strength and endurance. The next step is an interview that consists of a panel of Firefighters and members of Human Resources. The candidates are ranked and put on a hiring list. As openings occur, the candidates are pulled from the list to fill the vacancies as retirements occur. Usually only a few vacancies occur each year.



The newly hired Firefighter is expected to complete the Firefighter I and II courses with the Arkansas Fire Academy as soon as they are hired. They must successfully complete the four-year Joint Apprentice-ship Training Program with the department. They must also complete and pass their Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) course within the first three years from date of hire.

Approximately 11% of the department personnel are Paramedics. Paramedics are an advanced form of the EMT. They are able to perform invasive procedures such as advanced airways and IV's. The Paramedic course is a year and a half long advanced skills course which requires hundreds of hours of clinical and ambulance ride time. Some of the classes covered are cardiology, anatomy and physiology and pharmacology.

Firefighters have to be trained in firefighting techniques, vehicle extrication, boat operation, EMT skills, technical rescue (including rope, trench, confined

space, swift water), hazardous materials response and other areas. The firefighter must have good people skills in order to deal with the many personalities that they encounter. The firefighter has to be able to think outside the box and develop a course of action for whatever situation they are faced with. They must also be able to operate as a team and take direction. The NLRFD Firefighter must be able to empathize with a patient but be able to function without becoming emotional as to provide the best care possible.

Many First Responders develop Post Traumatic Stress as a result of years of responding to fires, vehicle accidents, trauma, sickness and death. Talking with friends and fellow Firefighters seems to help but sometimes professional counseling is needed.

The overall goal of the NLR Fire Department is to prevent the loss of life and property to citizens that are entrusted to our care, through direct intervention and preventative education. Much training and quality assurance is done to ensure that we are providing the best response and care for our NLR residents.



Highlights from some City Departments

Mayor Joe A. Smith holds a monthly department head meeting. Department heads provide a report of activities, projects and accomplishments. Below are a few highlights from the last meeting (July events).

Hays Center—68 new members. 11,450 visits for the month. Activities included: The Governor's Advisory Council on Aging, Crochet class, Member Vendor Day, "Monday Craft Madness" and a presentation from North Little Rock Police Officer Greg Blankenship—Civilian Response to Active Shooters. Transported Public Senior Housing residents to medical appointments and grocery stores, Bean Bag Baseball teams traveled to Little Rock for an "away game. Mayor's Office of Volunteer Services volunteers logged 1,322 hours.

Electric Customer Service—Direct contact—lobby payments, 14,470, Drive-thru payments, 8,327. Total payments received: 50,100 (Electric—38,108, CAW 7,733, Centerpoint 4,259).

Sanitation—Collected and disposed of 1,348.16 tons (2,696,320 lbs) of household garbage/rubbish. Yard Waste crews collected and disposed 101 loads; 2,422 cubic yards of green waste. Picked up 441 tires.

Traffic Services—approved 70 barricade applications for permits. Repaired or replaced 224 signs and posts, marked 6 city vehicles with logo, 91 Arkansas One Call location requests. **Electric Department**—38,724 customers, Peak Power—226,341 KW, Territory—60 square miles, miles of wire—555.1 miles, # Transformers—11,252, Street lights—11,058 (251 repaired), Security lights—4,261

Police—June numbers show decreases in the following areas: Robberies— down 23%, Property crime down—24%. Overall crime up +2.4%.

North Little Rock Convention & Visitors Bureau—Visitors Information Center in Burns Park had 1,187 visitors in July. The Arkansas Inland Maritime Museum had 2,947 visitors which included the USS Baltimore Submarine Reunion.



Swedish Apple Pie found in Natural Temptations—Recipes from the Junior League of North Little Rock



2 cups sliced apples 2 tablespoons flour

1/3 cup sugar Pinch of salt

1 egg1 teaspoon vanilla extract1 cup sour cream1 unbaked (9-inch) pie shell

Topping
1/3 cup sugar
1/3 cup flour

1 teaspoon cinnamon 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter

Combine the apples, 2 tablespoons flour, 1/3 cup sugar, salt, egg, vanilla and sour cream in a bowl and mix well. Spoon into the pie shell. Bake at 350 degrees fro 30 minutes.

Topping: Combine 1/3 cup sugar, 1/3 cup flour and cinnamon in a bowl and mix well. Cut in the butter until crumbly. Sprinkle evenly over the pie. Bake for 15 minutes longer. Yield 6 to 8 servings (depending on how you slice it!)

Coffee Cake found in Natural Temptations—Recipes from the Junior League of North Little Rock

1 (2-layer) package yellow cake mix

1/2 cup sugar

3/4 cup vegetable oil

1 teaspoon imitation butter flavoring

1 cup chopped pecans

1 (4 ounce) package vanilla instant pudding mix

3/4 cup water

4 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

2 teaspoons cinnamon

Combine the cake mix, pudding mix, sugar, water, oil, eggs, butter flavoring and vanilla in a bowl and mix until smooth and creamy. Pour 1/2 of the batter into a bundt pan. Sprinkle with 1/2 of the pecans and 1/2 of the cinnamon. Pour remaining batter over the pecans. Sprinkle the remaining pecans and cinnamon over the batter. Bake at 350 degrees for 50 minutes. Cool in the pan for 10 minutes. Invest onto a serving plate. Drizzle Butter Icing over the Cake.

Butter lains

1 cup confectioners' sugar 3 tablespoons milk

1/2 teaspoon imitation butter flavoring 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

Combine ingredients in a bowl and mix until smooth. Drizzle over cake (see above).



Chicken Tortilla Soup found in Gooseberry Patch—Weeknight Dinners Cookbook

4 boneless, skinless chicken breasts

15-oz can tomato sauce

2 15-oz cans Mexican-style stewed tomatoes

4-oz can chopped green chilies

2 15-oz cans black beans

15-oz can tomato sauce

1 cup salsa

Tortilla chips

Shredded Cheddar cheese—for garnish

Place chicken in a slow cooker. In a bowl, mix undrained tomatoes, chilies and beans. Stir in sauce and salsa; spoon over chicken. Cover and cook on low setting for 8 hours. Just before serving remove chicken and cut into bite-sized pieces; stir back into mixture in slow cooker.

To serve, line soup bowl with tortilla chips. Ladle soup over chips and top with cheese. Serves 6 to 8.

Question: If someone comes to my home selling Newspaper subscriptions, are they required to have a door-to-door peddlers permit?

Answer: Yes. *Anyone* going door to door in the North Little Rock City Limits is required to have a peddlers permit and ID issued by the City Clerk's Office. Other examples include newspapers, pest control, alarm systems, home improvements, etc.

Reminder to residents:

If someone comes to your door, you do not have to answer or let them in. If someone comes to your door and makes you uncomfortable please call the police. If someone comes to your door and is unable to produce an ID issued by the City of North Little Rock City Clerk and Treasurer's Office (similar to the example on this page), please call 501-758-1234.

In all cases, if you call please provide a description of the person, location and vehicle description and license number if possible. You can also call the North Little Rock City Clerk/Treasurer's Office Monday through Friday 8:00 a.m.—4:30 p.m. to verify any business license or peddlers permit in our city at 501-975-8617.

Effective July 2, the penalty for not renewing or doing business in the city since January 1, 2018 is 50% of the total amount due.

Reminder—ALL businesses doing business within the city limits of North Little Rock are required to have a current Business/Privilege License. Businesses that are not licensed are subject to a citation (and court appearance) for operating a business without a license.
