This is a reminder from the ASPCA for Holiday Safety Tips for your furry family members.

The holiday season is upon us, and many pet parents plan to include their furry companions in the festivities. As you gear up for the holidays, it is important to try to keep your pet's eating and exercise habits as close to their normal routine as possible. Also, please be sure to steer pets clear of the following unhealthy treats, toxic plants and dangerous decorations.

#### Be Careful with Seasonal Plants and Decorations

—Oh, Christmas Tree: Securely anchor your Christmas tree so it doesn't tip and fall, causing possible injury to your pet. This will also prevent the tree water—which may contain fertilizers that can cause stomach upset—from spilling. Stagnant tree water is a breeding ground for bacteria, and your pet could end up with nausea or diarrhea should he imbibe.



—Avoid Mistletoe & Holly: Holly, when ingested, can cause pets to suffer nausea, vomiting and diarrhea. Mistletoe can cause gastrointestinal upset and cardiovascular problems. And many varieties of lilies can cause kidney failure in cats if ingested. Opt for just-as-jolly artificial plants made from silk or plastic, or choose a pet-safe bouquet.

—Tinsel-less Town: Kitties love this sparkly, light-catching "toy" that's easy to bat around and carry in their mouths. But a nibble can lead to a swallow, which can lead to an obstructed digestive tract, severe vomiting, dehydration and possible surgery. It's best to brighten your boughs with something other than tinsel.

—That Holiday Glow: Don't leave lighted candles unattended. Pets may burn themselves or cause a fire if they knock candles over. Be sure to use appropriate candle holders, placed on a stable surface. And if you leave the room, put the candle out!

—Wired Up: Keep wires, batteries and glass or plastic ornaments out of paws' reach. A wire can deliver a potentially lethal electrical shock and a punctured battery can cause burns to the mouth and esophagus, while shards of breakable ornaments can damage your pet's mouth and digestive tract.

Winter holidays are a time for families and friends to get together.

But that also means a greater risk for fire. Following a few simple tips will ensure a happy and fire-safe holiday season.



#### HOLIDAY DECORATING

- Be careful with holiday decorations. Choose decorations that are flame resistant or flame retardant.
- Keep lit candles away from decorations and other things that can burn.
- Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both.
- Replace any string of lights with worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. Read manufacturer's instructions for number of light strands to connect.
- Use clips, not nails, to hang lights so the cords do not get damaged.
- Keep decorations away from windows and doors.

#### **HOLIDAY ENTERTAINING**

- Test your smoke alarms and tell guests about your home fire escape plan.
- Keep children and pets away from lit candles.
- Keep matches and lighters up high in a locked cabinet.
- Stay in the kitchen when cooking on the stovetop.
- Ask smokers to smoke outside. Remind smokers to keep their smoking materials with them so young children do not touch them.
- Provide large, deep ashtrays for smokers. Wet cigarette butts with water before discarding.

#### Before Heading Out or to Bed

**Blow out** lit candles when you leave the room or go to bed. **Turn off** all light strings and decorations before leaving home or going to bed.

#### Facts:

Two of every five home decoration fires are started by candles.

**Nearly half** of decoration fires happen because decorations are placed to close to a heat source.

#### Highlights from some City Departments



Mayor Joe A. Smith holds a monthly department head meeting. Department heads provide a report of activities, projects and accomplishments. Below are a few highlights from the last meeting (October events).

Hays Center—57 new members. 11,281 visits for the month. 50 members went on a bus tour to Niagara Falls, Canada. "Flavors from Around the World" class was attended by 25 members who learned how to put a healthy twist on Asian fried rice. A Medicare 101 class was presented to discuss rules and regulations. Provided 14 trips to Bryant Senior Center, Russellville Yarn Store shopping and Arkansas State Fair. Transported Public Senior Housing residents to bowling, medical appointments and grocery store. Hays Center volunteers logged 1,866 hours.

Electric Customer Service—Bad debt—\$16,372, New accts—1,130, Finaled accts—1,153. Customer calls—11,382. Direct contact: 2,433, inside teller payments: 8,133 Electric; 8,426 Gas/Water. Drive thru: 4,230 Electric; 4,859 Gas/Water. Online: 8,097.

**Sanitation**—Collected and disposed of 2,075.68 tons (4,151,360 lbs) of household garbage/rubbish. Yard Waste crews collected and disposed 95 loads; 2,573.2 cubic yards of mixed debris and green waste. Picked up 377 tires. Began leaf vacuum program for 2017/18.

**Traffic Services**—approved 126 barricade applications for permits. Repaired or replaced 189 signs and posts, marked 13 city vehicles with logo, 53 Arkansas One Call location requests.

**Police**—Crime numbers for September indicate continued rises in property crimes. 47 thefts from motor vehicles were reported. Overall property crime – 1.12%.

**Planning**—Major permits reviewed 2—Storage Units at 9100 Maumelle Blvd and Quadplex at 306 W 6th. New Commercial average \$285,047. Issued 8 new single family residential permits (average \$124,163). Also issued 12 Sign permits and 2 Banner permits. Inspectors completed 491 inspections and covered 4,611 miles:148 Electric; 109 Building; 135 Plumbing; 99 HVAC.

Electric Department—38,519 customers, Peak Power—184,000 KW, Territory— 60 square miles, miles of wire—555.1 miles, # Transformers—11,252, Street lights—11,049 (209 repaired), Security lights—4,215 (41 repaired), Smart meters—39,401, Revenue—\$8,192,031. Major outages—10-28 at 20:30 hours Entergy dropped Westgate Substation 1 & 2 due to a large raccoon in the bus tie switch. 6,361 customers affected 2.5 to 3.5 hours.

Code Enforcement—99 assigned calls, 601 initiated calls, 63 citations, 323 violation notices, 170 vehicles tagged, 169 structures inspected, 32 rental inspections, 18 food service inspections, 0 search warrants, 2 houses demolished by city, 3 houses demolished by owner. Code Maintenance—164 assigned calls, 99 vacant lots cleaned, 29 lots with structures cleaned, secured 5 vacant houses, vacant lots mowed—93, lots with structures mowed—29.

North Little Rock Convention & Visitors Bureau—Visitors Information Center in Burns Park had 1,067 visitors in October. Downtown RV Park had 590 reservations/average stay 2.2 days. The Arkansas Inland Maritime Museum had 1,877 visitors.

**Parks & Recreation**—Parks Maintenance crews began winterizing fields and equipment. Park Ranger and his side-kick Shep worked along the Levy Trail, Arkansas River Trail and other park trails. Funland closed for the season. Numerous events were held around the city.



#### Music

Arkansas is steeped in **blues history** that dates all the way back to the start of the 20th century. It gained momentum in the '20s and '30s, then in 1941, "King Biscuit Time," a blues music radio program, began broadcasting five days a week on KFFA 1360 AM out of Helena. For the first time, blues was heard regularly over the airwaves in its birthplace, and recognition of both "King Biscuit Time" and the blues spread.

**Conway Twitty**, born Harold Lloyd Jenkins, was influential in both the country and rock genres. Growing up in Helena, Twitty became a successful rock artist, releasing several singles that hit No. 1 on the pop charts, such as "It's Only Make Believe" in 1958.

The idea for the **Ozark Folk Center** stemmed from the success of the Arkansas Folk Festival, which debuted in April 1963 in Mountain View under the partnership of the Ozark Foothills Handicraft Guild (later known as the Arkansas Craft Guild) and the Rackensack Folklore Society. Today the town is considered the home of American Folk Music.

In 1964, the world's most popular music group, **The Beatles**, visited the Lawrence County town of Walnut Ridge en route to Alton, Missouri. The Walnut Ridge airport was ideal for the group to change planes. On September 18, 2011, Walnut Ridge unveiled a monument, designed to look like the cover of the album "Abbey Road," to commemorate the event.




The Arkansas Symphony Orchestra was incorporated in 1966 after several previous and short-lived attempts to create a sustainable performing group.

In 1980, Dyess native and superstar **Johnny Cash** became the youngest person ever elected to the Country Music Hall of Fame.

On February 28, 1985, the Arkansas legislature approved Act 277, designating the **fiddle** as the official musical instrument of the state of Arkansas.

#### Movies

In 1928, award-winning silent-film director King Vidor shot his first talking picture in Arkansas and Tennessee. "Hallelujah" (1929) was the story of an African-American sharecropper-turned preacher who fought the temptations of a beautiful city girl. It was shot near the banks of the Mississippi River and in a swamp near



West Memphis.

An Arkansas landmark was featured in one of the most popular movies of all time. The opening credits of "Gone With the Wind" (1939) include several short scenes of Southern locations, including the Old Mill (right here) in North Little Rock, now in a city park. The site is the last location from the film still in existence today.

In the late 1960s, **Gov. Winthrop Rockefeller** promoted the state to filmmakers by offering help from his staff and state troopers in scouting out locations during production. In the next decade, Arkansas became a regular shooting site for independent films.

**Director/Producer Roger Corman** made two movies in Arkansas, including 1970's "Bloody Mama," starring Robert De Niro and "Boxcar Bertha" in 1972, Martin Scorsese's first Hollywood assignment.

Another major motion picture shot on Arkansas soil in the 1990s was based on the work of an Arkansas native. "The Firm" (1993) was adapted from a novel by best-selling author John Grisham, a native of Jonesboro. Some scenes were shot in West Memphis.

Malvern native **Billy Bob Thornton** developed and shot movies in the state in the early '90's, including "One False Move" (1992), which was shot near Brinkley and Cotton Plant, and notable film "Sling Blade" (1996) shot in Saline County. Thornton won an Academy Award for this screenplay and a nomination for his performance in the film as main character Karl Children.

"**Mud**" (2012) starring Matthew McConaughey and Reese Witherspoon was filmed in the Delta region by Arkansas native Jeff Nichols, who utilized locations in ...Continued on next page...

Crockett's Bluff, DeWitt, Dumas, Lake Village and Stuttgart, and hired more than 400 local residents to complete the movie.

The number of **movie festivals** across the state skyrocketed in recent years and includes the Hot Springs Documentary Film Festival (founded in 1992) and the Ozark Foothills FilmFest in Batesville (founded in 2001). In 2015, Academy Award-winning actress Geena Davis co-founded Arkansas's newest—the Bentonville Film Festival, which champions for women and diversity in films.

#### **Politics**

Arkansas became the **25th State** and made Little Rock its new capital in 1836. The fledgling state's population was just more than 50,000.

The early 1900s saw three major policies go into effect. **Prohibition** of the **manufacture and sale of alcohol** in 1916 and a **ban on alcohol importation** in 1917, and—also in 1917 — a



law granting Arkansas women the right to vote in party primaries.

Education took center state in 1957 when the Little Rock School District approved an integration plan at Little Rock Central High School. There was local opposition, including Gov. Orval Faubus calling Arkansas National Guard units to prevent the plan. President Eisenhower ordered the 101st Airborne Division to Little Rock to guard nine African-American students who became knows as the "Little Rock Nine."

Hope-born **Bill Clinton** was elected Governor of Arkansas in 1978. After serving for a decade, he pursued the White House and won. Clinton was elected the 42nd president of the United States in 1992, defeating Republican incumbent George H. W. Bush. Inaugurated at age 46, Clinton was the third-youngest president, and presided over the country's longest period of peacetime economic expansion. The William J. Clinton Presidential Library & Museum opened in Little Rock in November 2004.

The North Little Rock Senior Citizens Commission is currently accepting nominations for the 2018 inductee to the Senior Citizens Hall of Fame. Any person 55 years of age or older who is a resident or former resident of the city is eligible for consideration. Nominations may be made for deceased persons, as well.

Consideration for inclusion in the Hall of Fame will be made for contributions in areas including but not limited to the following:

- B. Volunteers in hospitals or related institutions
- C. Volunteers in housing, meals on wheels, etc.
- D. Activities for Senior Citizens (dances, activity centers)
- E. Involvement in respite care, health clinics, transportation, etc.
- F. Being an example to other seniors for service to others.

Letters of support from three different people must be attached.

Employment in services to senior citizens will not preclude consideration for election to the Hall of Fame.


