### New Route for Pedestrian/Bike Trail





The first public inconvenience resulting from the Broadway Bridge replacement began last month. The staging areas and pre-construction work is making it necessary to detour the Arkansas River Trail onto Riverfront Drive for about a quarter of a mile. New signage and crosswalks have been added to help facilitate the new, temporary route. Thanks for your patience and understanding.

The existing Broadway Bridge will be demolished and closed to traffic for six months beginning May 27, 2016, and the new bridge will open by Nov. 27 of the same year, according to a preliminary schedule put together by the contractor for the \$98.4 million project.

Much of the work in the 20 months leading up to the closure will take place underneath the existing bridge that crosses the Arkansas River between the downtowns of Little Rock and North Little Rock or off site.

### Why Spay or Neuter?

The decision to spay or neuter is an important one for pet owners. But it can be

#### Did you know...

#### Getting your pet spayed or neutered can:

Reduce the number of homeless pets killed Improve your pet's health Reduce unruly behavior Save on the cost of pet care

#### Pets are homeless everywhere

In every community, in every state, there are homeless animals. In the US, there are an estimated 6—8 million homeless animals entering animal shelters every year. Very few are adopted. Tragically, the rest are euthanized. These are healthy, sweet pets who would have made great companions.

Not all animals euthanized in shelters are the offspring of homeless "street" animals—these are the puppies and

kittens of cherished family pets and even purebreds. Spaying and neutering is the only permanent, 100% effective method of birth control for dogs and cats.

#### Your pet's health

A USA Today article (May 2013) cites that pets who live in the states with the highest rates of spaying/ neutering also live the longest. According to the report, neutered male dogs live 18% longer than un-neutered male dogs and spayed female dogs live 23% longer than unspayed females. The report goes on to add that in Mississippi, the lowest-ranking state for pet longevity, 44% of the dogs are not neutered or spayed.

Part of the reduced lifespan of unaltered pets can be attributed to their increased urge to roam, exposing them to fights with other animals, getting struck by cars, and other mishaps.

Another contributor to the increased longevity of altered pets involves the reduced risk of certain types of cancers. Unspayed female cats and dogs have a greater chance of developing pyrometra (a fatal uter-

Did you know female felines usually go into heat 4 to 5 days every 3 weeks during breeding season? ine infection), uterine cancer, and other cancers of the reproductive system.

Medical evidence indi-

Medical evidence indicates that females spayed before their first heat are typically healthier (Many veterinarians now sterilize dogs and cats as young as eight weeks of age.)

Male pets who are neutered eliminate their chances of getting testicular cancer, and it is thought they have lowered rates of prostrate cancer, as well.

Getting your pets spayed/neutered will not change their fundamental personality, like their protective instinct.

#### **Curbing bad behavior**

Unneutered dogs are much more assertive and prone to urine-marking (lifting his leg) than neutered dogs. Although it is most often associated with male dogs, females may do it, too. Spaying or neutering your dog should reduce urine-marking and may stop it altogether.

For cats the urge to spray is extremely strong in an intact cat, and the simplest solution is to get yours neutered or spayed by 4 months of age before there's even a problem. Neutering solves 90 percent of all marking issues, even in cats that have been doing it for a while. It can also minimize howling, the urge to roam, and fighting with other males.

In both cats and dogs, the longer you wait, the greater the risk you run of the surgery not doing the trick because the

behavior is so ingrained.

Other behavioral problems that can be ameliorated by spay/neuter include:

Roaming—especially when females are "in heat." Aggression: Studies also show that most dog bites involve dogs who are unaltered.

Excessive barking, mounting, and other dominance-related behaviors.

While getting your pet spayed/neutered can help curb undesirable behaviors, it will not change their fundamental personality, like their protective instinct.

#### Cost cutting

In many city's renewing your pet's license can be more expensive. Many areas have spay/neuter laws that require pets to be sterilized, or require people with unaltered pets to pay higher license renewal fees.

#### Low cost Spay/Neuter

The city of North Little Rock Animal Control and non-profit North Little Rock Friends of Animals provide low cost spay and neuter for qualifying families. For information call 791-8577.

### **Disaster Supply Kit**

Arkansas Department of Emergency Management Preparedness is everyone's responsibility. During the first few hours or days following a disaster, essential services may not be available. Citizens must be prepared for self-sustainability until help arrives.

So, where do you start? Put together an Emergency Supply Kit that will meet the needs of your family (and pets). The kit should be tailored to meet the basic needs of your family for a 72 hour period. Store your emergency supplies in one location that is easily accessible if evacuation is required. Items may be stored in a large storage bin, suitcase, duffle bag or individual packs.

Battery-Powered Radio Water Storage (1 gal/day/person) Manual Can Opener Candles Flashlight and Batteries Sleeping Bag and Blankets Utility Knife Non-Perishable Food Items First Aid Kit
Water Purification Tablets
Waterproof Matches
Extra Eyeglasses/Contacts

(Suggested non-perishable food items: ready-to-eat foods in non-breakable containers, canned meats, juice, fruits and vegetables, powdered milk, infant foods, crackers, peanut butter, freeze-dried and dehydrated foods.)

#### **Establish and Out-of-State 24 Hour Telephone** Contact

Calls out will not overload phone lines as will calls coming into a disaster area.

Relatives should be informed on procedures to call the phone contact before a disaster occurs. Individual location and status should be requested.

Take color pictures of every room plus pictures of valuables. Send one copy of legal papers and one copy of pictures to an out-of-state contact.



#### **Plan How Your Family Will** Stay in Contact if Separated by Disaster

Pick two meeting places:

- 1. A location that's a safe distance from your home in case of
- 2. A place outside your neighborhood in case you can't return home.

Plan how the neighborhood could work together after a disaster. Know your neighbors' skills (medical, technical). Con-

sider how you could help neighbors who have special needs, such as elderly or disabled persons. Make plans for child care in case parents can't get home.

#### **How to Store Water**

If you need to find water outside your home, use the following sources and be sure to purify the water by:

- Disinfection (household liquid bleach: 16 drops/ gal. of water, stir and let stand 30 minutes)
- Distillation (boil pot water and collect the vapor by tying a cup to the upside down pot lid—the cup shouldn't dangle in the water—it will condense back to water in the cup)

#### Sources:

- Rainwater
- Streams, rivers, and other moving bodies of water
- Ponds and lakes
- **Natural Springs**

#### Other Considerations:

- Stock supplies to last several days to a week for each family member
- Be prepared to relocate to a shelter during a prolonged power outage
- Have extra cash on hand in case electronic transactions (ATM card, credit cards, etc.) cannot be processed
- Work with your family in taking about steps each needs to take to be ready if disaster happens.

#### Highlights from some City Departments



Mayor Joe A. Smith holds a monthly department head meeting. Department heads provide a report of activities, projects and accomplishments. Below are a few highlights from the last meeting (January events).

**Central Arkansas Water**—began work on water rates for 2016-2019...no anticipated increase in 2016. Long time employee Darrell Boggs retired and will become CEO of Arkansas One Call and ARKUPS.

**Laman Library**—71 programs had 1,461 attendees. 833 people visited 'Small Works' exhibit at Laman Library. 1,256 people visited 'The Grand Ole Opry' and 'Beyond Layers' exhibits at the Argenta Branch.

**Neighborhood Services**—Mailed 3 neighborhood group and Neighborhood News newsletters to 3,790 households. Attended various meetings and assisted neighborhood associations with a variety of issues.

Hays Center—960 new members joined in 2014. Trips included Bryant Senior Center, Murray's Dinner Theater, Leon's Steak House in Pine Bluff, Hot Springs Jazz Society, Searcy Senior Center, Hot Springs Winery Tour with lunch at Zoe's, Dondies Sea Food Buffett and a Red Hat Trip. Reopened Aerobics pool which had been closed to refinish the plaster. Researching request for WiFi at center. In December had 1,533 volunteer service hours in 35 departments citywide.

**IS**—112 work orders, 9 web postings (departments are now posting their own information), multiple ongoing projects in majority of city departments.

**Street Department**—Patchwork citywide. Cut and cleaned alleys in downtown area. Ran down Greenlea Lake, flushed pipes and basins around city. Repaired sinkhole in Stonelinks and on East Bethany. Cleaned ditch along edge of airport.

**Sanitation**—Collected and disposed of 1,556.73 tons (3,113,460 lbs) of household garbage/rubbish. Yard Waste crews collected and disposed 164 loads; 369 cubic yards of mixed debris along with 4,383 cubic yards of green waste. Leaf crews collected 99 loads (3,637.0 cubic yards) of loose leaves (note: Leaf crews working 9 hour days 6 days a week. Several move-outs picked up and 327 tires. Issued 56 Sanita-

tion Code notices/letters and 6 citations for noncompliance.

**Traffic Services**—approved 539 barricade applications for permits. Repaired or replaced 84 signs and 20 posts.

**Safety Department**—settled claim for replacement of camera \$12,266.64, settled claim for pole and light \$1,592.90. Trying to collect on claim involving Traffic Control Cabinet—\$11,780.35.

**Police**—End of year: Theft from motor vehicles — 31.55%, all property crimes —24.25%, Robbery — 36.96%. No homicides. Use of Social Media through Facebook up to 5,666. Use of Facebook resulted in arrests related to convenience store robbery where clerk was shot. January 1, 30 officers transferred within the Patrol Division to new areas to allow fresh eyes in neighborhoods. Shop With A Cop Program provided 50 pairs of winter gloves to the Friendly Chapel to be given to homeless people.

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

Hosted class for Animal Control and Law Enforcement Officers from multiple agencies statewide covering basics of Animal Control, Rabies and laws pertaining to Rabies Quarantine. Participated in Southern Paws Transport event at Little Rock's Bar Louie where lots of puppies found new homes. East Initiative Class at Lakewood Middle School hosted Paws and Claws Pictures event which raised over \$400 for Friends of Animals. Participated in North Shore Animal League's 2nd Annual Kitten Bowl event January 31 in conjunction with Hallmark Channel's event. Impounded 21 illegal Pit Bull dogs and sent three rabies specimens to the State Health Department for testing.

#### North Little Rock Visitors Bureau / A&P

Visitor Information Center (Burns Park) had 703 visitors. Arkansas Inland Maritime Museum had 889 visitors including birthday parties, overnight stays, school groups, etc. RV Park had 730 RV's with an average stay of 4.15 days. Top 5 restaurants (based on sales) Golden Corral, Red Lobster, Chick Fil-A, Olive Garden and Cracker Barrel.

Parks and Recreation—Free Basic Tax Assistance is available to taxpayers making \$53,000 or less, with disabilities, elderly and/or limited English speaking persons. The service is provided by Volunteer Income Tax Assistance retired/trained IRS employees every Tuesday through April 13, 2015 from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the North Little Rock Community Center. Park Ranger Ian Hope and his partner Shep are educating youth about snake habits, habitat, behavior, eating preferences and more through presentations.

The Park Ranger has three 'staff snakes' named Twisty, Corny and Reggie. For more information on this presentation call Ian at 580-7095. A new sport is being considered called 'Foot-Golf' where players kick a soccer ball into a 21" hole on the golf course. Burns Park has a fully handicapped accessible canoe and kayak launce (the only one in central Arkansas) build with a grant from the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission. It is located on White Oak Bayou by the archery range. People are encouraged to visit the new and improved nlrpr.org website for information and upcoming events. North Little Rock Parks and Recreation Starz competed in the CheerSport Little Rock Grand Championships and won the Best of Recreation Award.

#### **Practice Safe Computer & Email Use**

A common (and unfortunately, effective) technique for luring e -mail users into opening virus-

launching attachments is to send messages that would appear to be relevant or important to many of their potential recipients.

One way of accomplishing this feat is to make the virus-carrying messages appear to come from some type of business entity that many people commonly deal with, such as eBay, UPS, USPS, FedEx, or a national bank (or other financial institution), or a major provider of a common service. You have to remember these emails appear to be from reputable companies containing messages which cause you concern, or attempt to get you to take action by clicking on a link in the email.

A mass mailing of this type is bound to hit quite a few people who during the past holiday season may have shipped parcels, make online purchases, sent mail and therefore might easily be lured into opening the virus-launching attachment.

**NEVER** click on a link in the email, even if you think it is valid. Remember, there is always another way to verify the information. **INSTEAD**, go to the actual website through your internet browser or call the company to verify.

Please be aware there are very dangerous emails out there which can contain virus links, resulting in computers being infected or potentially damaged with files corrupted or destroyed in the process.

We discourage the use of USB or portable/ removable drives since malware can originate from these devises as well as destroy files when portable drives are plugged while you open email or do internet searches.

In addition, we all know better than to give our credit card information or social security information to someone who calls on the phone no matter who or what they tell you. Instead, get a phone number and return the call or research the company and get the phone number. Nor, should you risk financial information.

Make sure you know what you are opening and why you are opening it, especially in an email. It is better to be safe than to be curious when you see links in your email, or while searching the internet.

#### **Using Public Wi-Fi**

Smartphones are now a staple of everyday activities. Whether it's for work or play, the average American uses their cell phone throughout the day. But, logging on could make you a victim of the fastest growing crime in America—identity theft.

Free Wi-Fi is everywhere. It's a draw for businesses to get you in the door. And with everything we do on our phones, we use it everywhere. However, using public Wi-Fi can put your personal information at risk. 17 million people were victims of identity theft over a 12 month period in 2012.

How does someone steal your identity? All they need is a phone and Wi-Fi. There are two types of Wi-Fi attacks. Passive attacks which watch your network traffic, and active attacks.

Think of a passive attack as someone eavesdropping on your conversation, watching for the important information.

People need to realize that Facebook or checking email can open you up to up to attacks. Partly, because it is common for a person to use the same user name and password for multiple sites. If a hacker can intercept your password from one site, he may be able to use it for another, more important site—like your bank.

#### How can you protect yourself?



Connect to the right Wi-Fi hotspot. Don't use an unsecured one. If at all possible, ask the business or facility you're in if they have a password protected hotspot, and use that one. Sometimes hackers will sit inside say

McDonalds or Starbucks and set up their own hotspot and call it 'McDonalds Free Wi-Fi' or 'Starbucks Free Wi-Fi' hoping that people who come in will use it.

Don't enter any usernames or passwords if you're not sure that connection is encrypted. Check for the green lock in your computer browser. On your smart phone, you should see a similar lock.

Never log on to any bank or credit card websites

through a public Wi-Fi source.

Wherever you are or whatever you are doing, always be mindful of who else is out there looking for an easy way to get your information.

We exercise, workout, play cards, sing, dance, work puzzles, travel, eat, talk, talk with friends, talk with instructors, talk with nurses, talk with staff (we talk a lot!), drink coffee, play bean bag baseball, play volleyball, swap stories, swim, walk, run, stretch, do yoga, Tai Chi, Pilates, Water Aerobics, Zumba, learn computers, make music, meet old friends, make new friends, do arts and crafts of all sorts and laugh...Laugh A Lot!

The center responds to our diverse needs and interests, enhances our dignity, supports our independence, and encourages our involvement in and with the center and the community.

The feeling, the 'vibe' of the place is, well,...it's just Up!...Great!...Positive!

For my first 3 or 4 years here, I thought "boy, I sure have met a <u>lot</u> of <u>good</u> people." Then it slowly dawned on me that, #1, out of hundreds and hundreds of people I've met at Hays, <u>hardly ever</u> was there an "old grump" or even a disagreeable soul, and, #2 almost every one of those hundreds & hundreds were pleasant, nice, friendly and easy to become friends with.

So...I've formed a theory: The Hays Center is a Filter. I believe this is unintentional and accidental, but a

filter none the less, and I believe this is great! People who join Hays want to do better, be better. They are optimistic, up, positive. The negative old grumps don't join (mostly).

So, we end up with this huge group of way above average, positive, optimistic people, and what a pleasure they are to be around. A wonderful antidote to the non-stop stream of 24-hr news (which, if you watch or listen to very much, might lead you to believe people are uncaring, mean or worse!)

The people here, members <u>and</u> staff, are the counterpoint and rebuttal to the news. They are, quite simply, <u>wonderful!</u>

I tell people that the Hays Center saved my life. I do not say this lightly and it is no exaggeration. When I joined 11 years ago, I was 50 pounds heavier, with very high blood pressure, very high cholesterol, just diagnosed with Type II Diabetes, and suffering from recurrent low grade depression.

From the day I joined Hays, I started getting better. I get better each year and eagerly anticipate this amazing expansion of happiness, contentment, and gratefulness.

In my not so humble opinion, the Hays Center is one of, maybe even *the* finest examples of what a city can do for it's citizens.

I will forever be in debt to the visionaries who conceived this; the movers and shakers who made it happen; and the staff in the trenches who daily toil to care for us and our endless concerns, complaints and confusion. You may not hear it enough, but every member I know readily admits the staff is outstanding, and go above and beyond to accommodate us and keep us safe.

#### What is Domestic Abuse?

Arkansas law defines "domestic abuse" as physical harm, bodily injury, assault, or the infliction of fear of imminent physical harm, bodily injury or assault, between family or household members, or sexual contact between family or household members, whether minors or adults, which constitutes a crime under Arkansas laws.

The victim must show that they are in immediate and present danger of domestic abuse to meet the criteria for obtaining an Order of Protection. There are rules stating that a victim must show resent injuries or have suffered a physical attack. Many judges recognize that the victim is aware of impending attacks due to the history of abuse and the verbal threats of the batterer.

There is no excuse for domestic violence. If you are a victim of domestic abuse, or suspect a friend or family members may be, contact the Arkansas Coalition Against Domestic


#### Phishing Scams

Recently, the second-largest U.S. health insurer said their data breach likely began as early as December after attackers first used phishing e-mails to trick up to five of its employees into visiting malicious websites or executing malware—and that related intrusions likely continued until late January, when suspicious database queries were first detected, the company spokesperson to the Associated Press. Investigators, who confirmed the breach found unauthorized data queries that date from the December date, although some of those queries were blocked by the company's automated defenses.

These scams are designed to capture personal information—known as 'phishing' - are designed to appear as if

they are from a legitimate company, for credit monitoring. Some e-mails are phishing e-mails from a fictitious source subject line "Cyber Attack Against grammatical errors.

#### **Smothered** Chicken Casserole

Betty Crocker 1 Tblsp oil 4 boneless skinless chicken thighs

1/2 tsp garlic salt

1/4 tsp pepper

6 oz uncooked angel hair pasta

1 can (10 3/4 oz) condensed Cream of Chicken Soup

1 1/4 cups half-and-half

1/2 tsp smoked paprika

2 cups Green Giant Steamers frozen broccoli florets (cut into smaller pieces (or maybe any frozen broccoli chopped) 3 slices precooked bacon, crumbled




