A Smoldering Threat

According to the American Red Cross, Arkansas ranks in the top five nationally for residential fires.

Here are a few fire safety tips:

When building a fire in a fire place, use a screen to make sure the embers do not pop out. Embers can smolder overnight in carpet or upholstery and cause a fire.



Have the chimney and flue inspected yearly to be sure both are functioning properly. If either gets off-kilter, it can result in a fire.

Buy homeowners' or renters' insurance. No one wants to see all their valuables go up in flames. This is particularly important in apartments and homes in subdivisions with small lots since fires

can spread from unit to unit, home to home, very quickly.

Have your heating and cooling unit serviced each year to prevent malfunctions.

Don't put anything other than pots and pans on top of the stove. Towels, paper plates and other household items can go up in flames quickly.

Make sure the wiring in any home or apartment is

up to code before agreeing to buy or rent. Often faulty wiring is to blame for residential fires.

If the power goes out, do not start a fire in a poorly ventilated space.

Keep matches and all other flammable materials away from children.

Get rid of old newspapers or rags that might create a fire hazard.

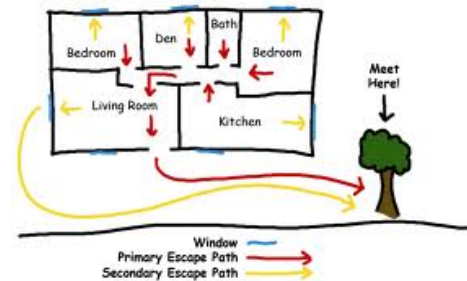
Keep the lint trap on the cloths dryer cleaned out. A clogged lint filter has caused more than a few fires.

Do not leave a space heater unattended for any length of time, and be sure nothing is within 3 feet of a heater. The same is true of wood stoves and fires in fireplaces.

Smoke detectors should be centrally located on each level of a home. For one-story ranch-style homes, place a smoke detector at each end of the structure to detect smoke. (A smoke detector that also has a CO2 monitor is ideal).

Test all smoke alarms regularly to make sure they still work.

Create an evacuation plan for your family in case of a fire. Pick a spot in your neighborhood to meet, and teach kids what to do if they smell smoke or see a fire.

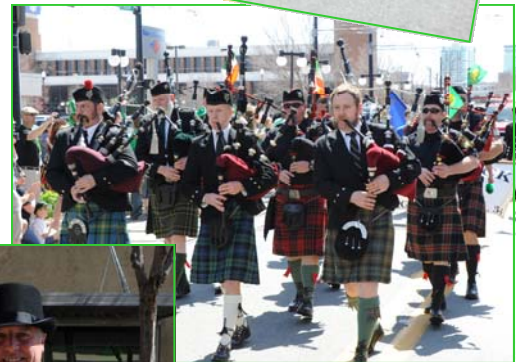

North Little Rock Police Warn of Phishing Scam

Currently, Central Arkansas is experiencing a phishing scam in which the suspects are contacting victims with Robo-calls and text messages. The suspects are advising victims their debit or credit cards have been canceled by mistake or some version of this. The area banks are aware of this scam and are attempting to notify their customers.

Sergeant Brian Dedrick, Public Information Officer, North Little Rock Police Department, said people need to be aware this is a dialing scam going on in this market with several financial institutions where an automated telephone service is calling people at random with the following message "your debit card has been deactivated. To reactivate, press 1..."

Dedrick said, "Please remember that Financial Institutions will never call customers and ask for debit card information. If you receive a call from a customer, please let them know they should not give out their debit card number or any financial information. This automated call is originating out of Florida."

Fluffy Cheese and Greens Frittata

—found in Weight Watchers Magazine September/October 2012

Prep 10 MIN COOK/BAKE 35 MIN SERVES 4

Preheat oven to 350°. Heat **2 tsp olive oil** in large nonstick skillet over medium heat. Add **1 chopped small onion** and **1 thinly sliced small carrot**; cook, stirring, until vegetables begin to brown, 5 minutes. Add **1/4 c water** and cook until vegetables are tender and liquid evaporates, 3 minutes. Add **1 (10-oz) pkg thawed and squeezed-dry frozen chopped spinach** and cook, stirring until spinach is hot, 5 minutes. Remove pan from heat. Meanwhile, whisk **3 large eggs**, **1/2 c part-skim ricotta**, **3 Tbsp grated Parmesan**, **1/2 tsp salt** and **1/4 tsp black pepper** in large bowl. With electric mixer on medium speed, (in another large bowl) beat **4 large egg whites** until stiff but not dry, peaks form. With rubber spatula, gently fold beaten whites into egg mixture, just until blended. Gently fold egg mixture into vegetables in skillet just until blended. Bake until center of frittata is set. 20 minutes. Cool 5 minutes. Cut into 4 wedges.

PER SERVING (1 Wedge) 191

Cal, 11 G total Fat, 4 G Sat Fat, 0 G Trans Fat, 153 MG Chol, 576 MG Sod, 9 G total Carb, 3 G total Sugar, 3 G

Add more veggies for the same point value!

Salsa Frittata—prepare previous recipe as directed. Add **1 tsp minced jalapeno pepper** to onion and carrot. Serve topped with **2 diced plum tomatoes** and **1 Tbsp chopped cilantro**.

Corn and Kale—prepare previous recipe as directed. Add **1/2 c fresh corn kernels** to onion and carrot and substitute **1 10-oz pkg thawed and squeezed-dry frozen chopped kale** for spinach.

Roasted Pepper—prepare previous recipe as directed. Add **1/2 c sliced roasted red and yellow bell peppers** (not packed in oil) to the spinach.

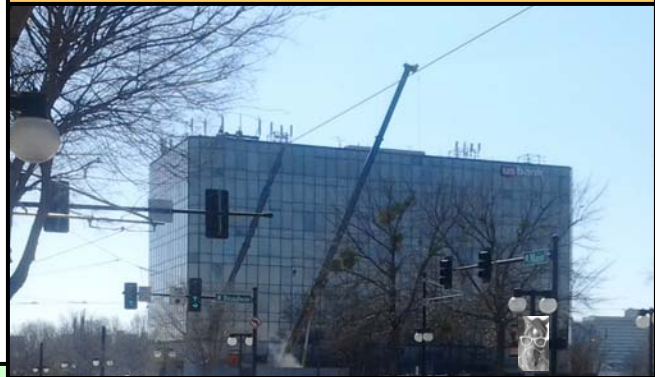
