Autumn Safety Tips for Fall from the ASPCA's website

Ah, fall—there's nothing like crisp, cool air, the first months of school and luscious foliage to get you excited for the changing seasons. Your pet, too, is probably welcoming the break from hot, sticky weather. But pet parents, beware—fall is also a time of lurking dangers for our furry friends. From household poisons to cold weather hazards, the season is a minefield! Here are some tips to keep your pet snug and healthy during the autumn months.

- The use of rodenticides increases in the fall as rodents seek shelter from the cooler temperatures by attempting to move indoors. Rodenticides are highly toxic to pets—if ingested, the results could be fatal. If you must use these products, do so with extreme caution and put them in places inaccessible to your pets.
- It's back-to-school time, and those of you with young children know that means stocking up on fun items like glue sticks, pencils and magic markers. These items are considered "low toxicity" to pets, which means they're unlikely to cause serious problems unless large amounts are ingested. However, since gastrointestinal upset and blockages certainly are possible, be sure children keep their school supplies out of paw's reach.
- Training tip: If you and your pooch haven't been active outdoors in a while because of the summer heat, do some remedial recall training. Dogs, like people, get rusty on their skills if they aren't using them.
- Fall and spring are mushroom seasons. While 99% of mushrooms have little to no toxicity, the 1% that are highly toxic can cause life-threatening problems in

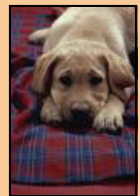

pets. Unfortunately, most of the highly toxic mushrooms are difficult to distinguish from the nontoxic ones, so the best way to keep pets from ingesting poisonous mushrooms is to keep them away from areas where any mushrooms are growing. Contact your veterinarian or the ASPCA Animal Poison Control Center immediately if you witness your pet eating a wild mushroom.

- In order to generate body heat, pets who exercise heavily outdoors, or who live outdoors, should be given more food during colder seasons. Make sure horses and other outdoor animals have access to clean, fresh water that is not frozen.
- Autumn is the season when snakes who are preparing for hibernation may be particularly "grumpy," increasing the possibility of severe bites to those unlucky pups who find themselves in the wrong place at the wrong time. Pet owners should know what kinds of venomous snakes may be in their environment—and where these snakes are most likely to be found—so they can keep pets out of those areas.
- Many people choose fall as the time to change their car's engine coolant. Ethylene glycol-based coolants are **highly toxic**, so spills should be cleaned up immediately. Consider switching to propylene glycol-based coolants—though they aren't completely non-toxic, they are much less toxic than other engine coolants.

James "Jim"

Toler Harvey

Jim Harvey, 72 of Little Rock, retired Chief Executive Officer of Central Arkansas Water and a Jackson County Farmer, died Tuesday, September 11. Jim was born December 13, 1939, in Swifton to Joe and Thelma

Harvey. He is survived by his loving wife of 50 years and best friend, Linda Allen Harvey; daughters Gaye Collins (Jan) and Jamie Harvey, of Little Rock; grandchildren, Cody Harvey Cortinez, Keifer Collins, and Cheyenne Collins; sister, Linda Norris of Swifton; and a host of friends and colleagues. He was preceded in death by son, Greg and his parents.

Jim served as CEO of Little Rock Municipal Water Works from 1996 through 2001 and CAS from 2001 until his retirement in April 2007. When the cities of Little Rock and North Little Rock merged their municipal water systems in 2001, they turned to him for his expertise in utility and business management. Jim spearheaded a seamless transition to merge operations, human resources and finances that included assets of \$225 million and a service area encompassing 360,000 consumers in 15 cities and communities.

He joined the U. S. Marine Corps at the age of 17 and served with the 11th Marines, First Marine Division, at Camp Pendleton, California from 1957-1959. After being honorably discharged from military service, he returned to his hometown of Swifton.

While employed with the Arkansas State Police as a dispatcher with the Arkansas State Police troop in Jonesboro, Jim enrolled in Arkansas State University. He earned a masters degree in chemistry in 1971. He accepted the job as chemist with LRMWW in June 1977 that led to a 35-year career. He earned a reputation as one of the top water quality experts in North America and was instrumental in the development of an international-accepted comprehensive training program entitled "Principles and Practices of Water Supply."

Jim will be greatly missed by all who knew him.

City of North Little Rock Fire Hydrant Testing

The Fire Department conducts fire hydrant tests twice a year—in April and October—to ensure the fire hydrants are operating properly and can be used in the event of a fire or other emergency that requires water.

- The increased flow of water from the fire hydrants during testing occasionally can result in discolored water at the customer's tap.
- The discolored water is bacteriologically safe but can stain clothing.
- **DO NOT WASH** clothing in the discolored water. Check for discolored water in your washing machine before washing clothes during designated fire hydrant testing periods for your area.

Oct 1-6 Area 1 bounded by I-40 on the north, city limits on the east and south, and I-30 on the west.

Oct 6-11 Area 2 bounded by city limits on the north and east, AR 107 on the west and I-40 on the south.

Chicken and Vegetables with Pineapple

- 1 1/4 lb. boneless skinless chicken thighs, cut into 1/2-inch strips
- 2 tablespoons soy sauce
- 2 medium carrots, sliced (about 3/4 cup)
- 1 (8 oz) can sliced water chestnuts, drained
- 1 (8 oz) can pineapple chunks in unsweetened juice, drained, reserving liquid

- 2 cups uncooked regular long-grain white rice
- 4 cups water
- 1/2 cup purchased sweet-and-sour sauce
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1 teaspoon grated gingerroot
- 1 1/2 cups fresh snow pea pods (about 6 oz)
- 3 green onions, cut into 1-inch pieces (if desired)

In 3 1/2 to 4 quart slow cooker, combine chicken and soy sauce; mix to coat evenly. Add carrots, water chestnuts and reserved pineapple juice. Stir to combine.

Cover; cook on low setting 4 to 5 hours.

About 30 minutes before serving, cook rice in water as directed on package.

Meanwhile, in small bowl, combine sweet-and-sour sauce, cornstarch and gingerroot; stir until well blended. Stir into chicken mixture. Add pea pods, onions and pineapple chunks; stir gently to mix. Increase heat setting to high; cover and cook an additional 20 to 25 minutes or until pea pods are crisp-tender. Serve chicken mixture over rice.

Makes 6 servings.

Slow Cooker Chicken and Dumplings

- 1 teaspoon oil
- 1 lb boneless skinless chicken thighs, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1 1/2 cups sliced celery
- 1 1/2 cups fresh baby carrots
- 1 cup sliced fresh mushrooms
- 1 (1.8 oz) package dry leek soup mix
- 4 cups water
- 1 (10.8 oz) can (5 biscuits) Pillsbury Grands! Refrigerated Flaky Biscuits
- 1 tablespoon cornmeal
- 1 1/2 cups Green Giant Frozen Sweet Peas
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper

Heat oil in medium skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Add chicken; cook and stir until browned.

In 4 to 6-quart slow cooker, combine chicken, celery, carrots, mushrooms, soup mix and water; mix well. Cover and cook on low setting 7 to 9 hours.

Separate dough into 5 biscuits; cut each into 8 wedges. Sprinkle wedges with cornmeal. Stir coated biscuits pieces into hot chicken mixture.



Cover and cook on high setting for an additional 25 to 30 minutes or until biscuits are no longer doughy in center.

About 10 minutes before serving, microwave peas in covered microwave-safe dish on HIGH for 3 to 4 minutes or until hot. Just before serving, stir peas and pepper into chicken mixture.

Makes 5 (1 3/4 cup) servings.

Chicken 'n Rice Gumbo Soup

- 3/4 lb boneless skinless chicken thighs, cut into 1-inch pieces
- 1/4 lb fully cooked smoked sausage (two 5-inch sausages), chopped
- 2 medium celery stalks (with leaves) sliced (1 1/4 cups)
- 1 medium onion, chopped (1/2 cup)
- 1 can (14 1/2 oz) stewed tomatoes, undrained
- 5 cups water
- 2 tablespoons chicken bouillon granules
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves
- 1 package (10 oz) frozen cut okra, thawed and drained
- 3 cups hot cooked rice
- Red pepper sauce, if desired

Mix all ingredients except okra, rice and pepper sauce in 4 to 5 quart slow cooker.

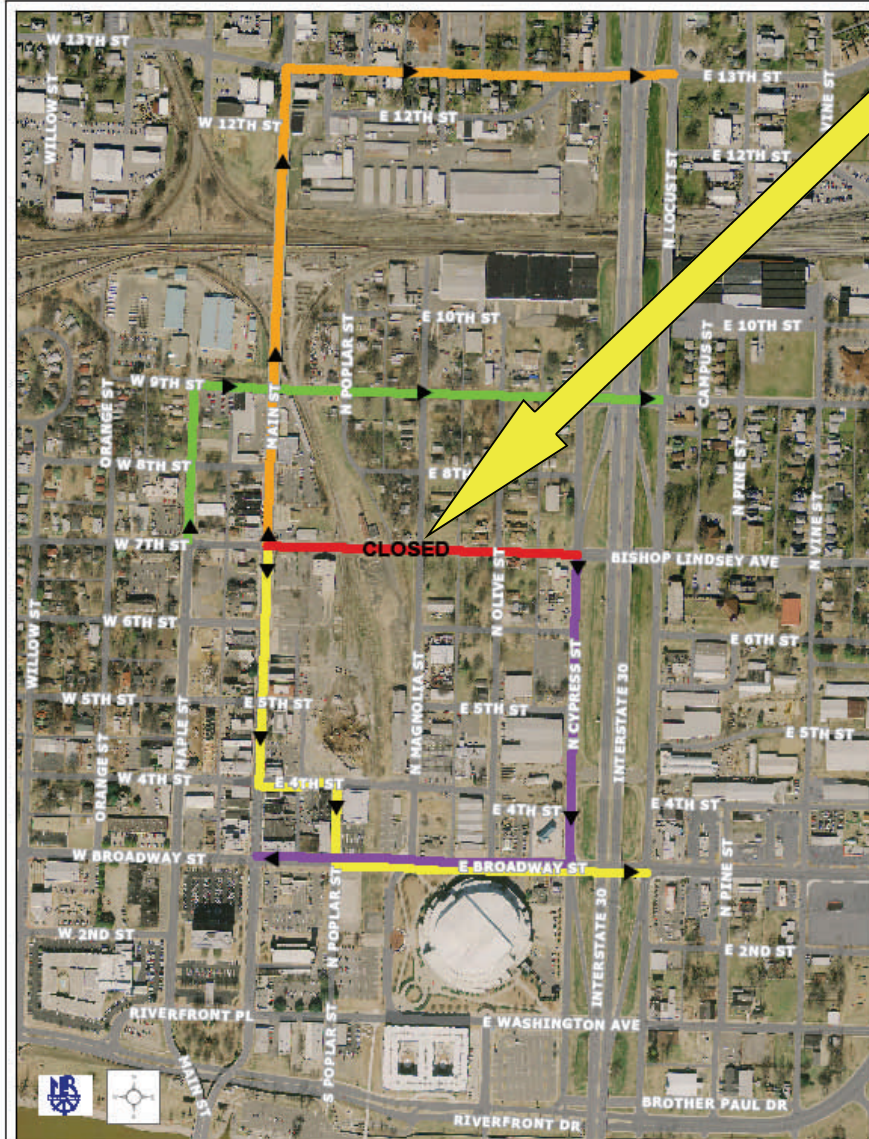
Cover and cook on low heat setting 6 1/2 hours to 7 hours or until

chicken is no longer pink in the center. Stir in okra. Cover and cook on low heat 20 minutes longer.

Spoon soup over rice in soup bowls. Serve with pepper sauce.

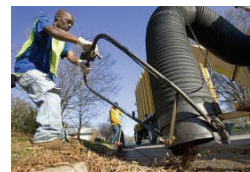

8-6-1702. State policy concerning disposal of yard waste.

It is the policy of this state that the open burning of residential yard waste should be discouraged and that alternative methods of yard waste disposal should be developed and made readily available to all citizens. In enforcement of this policy, state and local governments should first pursue educational and voluntary compliance efforts, with punitive safety hazards, or refusal to obey reasonable demands to cease open burning when alternative disposal methods are available. History: Acts 1997, No. 1152§2.

Burning yard waste (leaves) is not allowed in North Little Rock—violators can be fined \$100 + court costs.
