## Mayor's Summer Youth Program







Plans for the future Burns Park Fire Station #8 began back in 2018 to provide better service to North Little Rock residents and our firefighters. The new station has an estimated cost of \$2.8 million and will be completely funded by the current "half penny" approved by voters in 2017. The new fire station will be a tremendous upgrade to the one currently located at 6550 MacArthur Drive in the Amboy neighborhood and will ensure that North Little Rock Firefighters

will be able to respond and service its fire district faster and more efficiently. The new station in Burns Park will replace the existing Amboy fire station. In addition, the location of the new station will allow faster response times to other fire stations that are located on the perimeter of North Little Rock.

The new Burns Park Fire Station #8 will be constructed with decontamination rooms that will form clean and dirty contamination corridors for additional health and safety. The station will have four bedrooms, drive-thru bays and will house part of the department's hazmat team, the bicycle team, and will accommodate the department's second in-line battalion chief and battalion chief's quarters. In addition to the most modern features and designs, the station will be connected to a North Little Rock Fire Department Memorial that will serve as the department's place of honor for firefighters lost while on active duty.



Belinda Burney is a retired teacher from the Little Rock School District, and serves as a member of the North Little Rock History Commission. She is also the President of the Dark Hollow Community Development Corporation. Mrs. Burney and her mother, Delois Sykes, are very involved in the Dark Hollow Food Pantry and Clothes Closet, providing food and clothing to residents needing assistance in our city. Mrs. Burney is a founding member of the North Little Rock Neighborhood Association's Leadership Council and has attended training sessions for group leaders offered by the City of North Little Rock Neighborhood Services Department.

Mrs. Burney is the daughter of Curtis and Delois Mitchell Sykes. Mr. Sykes served on the North Little Rock History Commission and was instrumental in recognizing and preserving Black history in North Little Rock and across Arkansas. Mr. Sykes led





### **New Health Clinic in**



ayor Terry Hartwick held a meeting in January 12021 with health and community leaders to discuss the possibility of a much-needed healthcare clinic in Rose City for North Little Rock residents. Mayor Hartwick was born and raised in Rose City and is adamant about providing equitable services to all areas of our city. Equally as passionate about medical care in Rose City are Ward 2 City Council members Linda Robinson and Maurice Taylor. "Rose City residents currently have to catch a bus and ride to Springhill Drive or John F. Kennedy Boulevard to see a doctor at an urgent care clinic if they have medical needs. A health clinic in the east part of our city would be a great addition for our residents, and much more convenient," said North Little Rock City Council member Linda Robinson, who represents much of the city's east side. In mid-2021, the Arkansas Department of Health approached the City about a possible new location for the North Little Rock Health Department. At the time, no land was available; however, in February 2022 the North

Little Rock City Council approved the purchase of land located at 4112 and 4120 Baucum Pike and 4132 East Washington Avenue in North Little Rock for \$475,000. The parcel of land sits at the corner of Highway 70 (Broadway) and Highway 165, a perfect location. Residents in the east part of North Little Rock will soon have a new health clinic, as well as the North Little Rock unit of the Arkansas Department of Health.

The new healthcare clinic will be built by combining funds through the CARES Act, Community Development Block Grants and proceeds from the sale of unused city property. "Troy Wells, Chief Executive Officer with Baptist Health, and I are working together. The City of North Little Rock will purchase the property and build the structure. Baptist Health will lease the structure from the city and furnish it with doctors and nurses," Mayor Terry Hartwick shared. The City's goal is to continue the revitalization of Rose City and the East Broadway corridor by ongoing investments in the community.



## North Little Rock Electric to Permanently Close Drive-thru Services on August 31, 2022

Progress is always occurring in North Little Rock and with that comes some exciting changes. The City of North Little Rock will be re-developing the City Services building at 120 Main Street to better serve the community. With this change, the North Little Rock Electric Customer Service Department will be changing locations this fall. As a result, our drive-thru services will be permanently closing on August 31, 2022.

In the past two years, North Little Rock Electric has made many updates to our software and business processes and discovered that most of our customers would rather conduct business online, using an app, or by telephone. For customers still using the drive-thru, there are now five easy ways to pay your electric bill with NO payment processing fees.

Puentes to implement a municipal identification program. We
believe Seis Puentes is the natural place to oversee the implementation of our new Municipal
Identification Program because
of their relationship within the
immigrant community. Recently,
our city hosted an Open House
at Seis Puentes and printed 100
municipal identification cards

for residents. The new North Little Rock Municipal Identification Program will benefit the immigrant community and also the elderly, homeless and others who lack any form of identification in our City. Many people in our community are unaware of the problem that different groups of people encounter in beginning a new life. Many North Little Rock residents are in



need of identification for obtaining utilities and even opening a bank account. Through our partnership with Seis Puentes, we hope to help all groups of people in North Little Rock become more identifiable, involved and informed on the services and opportunities provided by our city and the Seis Puentes Resource Center. Identification cards are available weekly, Tuesday – Thursday, 9:30 am -

2:00 pm and Tuesday & Thursday, 5:30-6:30 pm as well as the following Saturdays from 9:00 am - 2:00 pm: July 9, August 13, and September 10. To obtain a municipal identification card, bring the following:

- 1. Proof of identity
- 2. Proof of residency in North Little Rock
- 3. Money order for \$15 \space 3

### Why is a 911 Dispatcher So Important?

o you ever watch crime shows and think about everything it takes to provide a response to the scene and the ultimate capture of the criminals? North Little Rock Emergency Services provides that! Isn't it intriguing how Hollywood is able to sensationalize the story, utilize computers and catch the bad guy? There is a lot of information at a 911 dispatcher's fingertips. Access to this information assists the North Little Rock Police Department and North Little Rock Fire Department to respond quickly to incidents and updates them with the call information as the incident unfolds.


Public Safety Dispatchers are trained to ask a variety of questions when a call is received in the 911 center. The more information the 911 dispatcher is able to obtain, the better the response time. This information is relayed to police units as they are dispatched. This is not Hollywood and crimes are not

solved nor convictions made in an hour like they are on television, but we do our best to provide the best of service to the public.

Our team offers a competitive, hourly salary range from \$16.91 to \$24.98, depending on qualifications, as well as great benefits: retirement, paid vaca-

tion and sick leave, medical insurance, 11 paid holidays per year, and longevity pay. Our team fosters respect, fairness and honesty and we need 911 dispatchers that have: 1) a high school diploma or equivalent, 2)

an ability to pass a criminal background investigation and 3) a willingness to work shift work, holidays and overtime. ## Park Hill Jump Start

Jump Start is an economic development project funded through Metroplan that uses money from the Department of Transportation. It was a competitive grant, and North Little Rock received two grants for the Park Hill and Levy Jump Start Projects. The development of each site and participants' desire to increase the walkability in their neighborhood was a major consideration when planning the Park Hill Jump Start Project.

A large number of public meetings have been held with local businesses and residents to gather input. Neighborhood notifications were sent to the entire community. It is hoped that improving the commercial corridor



in both neighborhoods, increasing the walkability, attracting new customers and growth of businesses will positively affect the residential neighborhoods adjacent to the business districts.

The Park Hill Jump Start project began in May of this year on the east side of John F. Kennedy Boulevard at "A" street, and is moving north to "H" street, then turning south on the west side of John F. Kennedy down to "A" street. Once both the east and west sides of John F. Kennedy Boulevard have been completed, the project will continue on the median. Scheduled completion date is May 2023.
