Disaster Preparedness, Working Together --

On Friday, March 31, 2023 a tornado crossed the Arkansas River and roared into Burns Park at 2:30 in the afternoon. It ran for 5.6 miles in a northeasterly direction, affecting Amboy, Levy, Cobblestone, and Indian Hills neighborhoods. It was 400 yards wide and was at the top of the F3 scale with 200 miles per hour winds. The Fujita Scale lists F3 as "SEVERE DAMAGE: Exterior walls and roofs blown off homes. Metal buildings collapsed or are severely damaged. Forests and farmland flattened." One person died and there were five major reported injuries. Hundreds of homes were affected with many sustaining major damage and some were destroyed.

Initial City Response

An Emergency Operations Center was set up within fifteen minutes of the tornado entering Burns Park. Firefighters immediately began searching damaged houses for injured/trapped people. House searches were completed Friday evening, but searchers again looked for people in damaged homes on Saturday in daylight. Street, Parks, and Traffic Services began clearing streets of fallen trees and closing streets with downed power lines. Hundreds of electrical poles were destroyed and miles of lines were down, tangled, or missing. 15,000 houses were without power. The Police Department fully mobilized, with all officers working twelve hour shifts, patrolling the affected areas to keep outsiders from entering the storm damaged areas. A shelter for those affected by the storm was set up at the Community Center on Willow Street. The shelter also accepted pets.

Look at the Helpers

Mr. Rogers from Mister Roger's Neighborhood advised to always look at the helpers when a disaster, natural or man-made, occurs. Hundreds of citizens helped during the immediate aftermath of the storm. People walked out their front doors, or parked and walked in when they got off work, and pitched in. It was neighbors helping neighbors. People with chainsaws cut up trees blocking streets, and other neighbors dragged the debris to the curbs. Many streets were either completely or partially cleared by neighbors working together. Areas that were dangerous enough to warrant professional attention were left. Neighbors checked on each other. It is impossible to overestimate the assistance that neighbors provided to neighbors, both physically and emotionally, in the first hours after the disaster.

Curbs Told the Story

Cleaning up debris and fallen trees in the neighborhoods came to a virtual standstill after the curb lines had been filled up. There was no place left to drag stuff. Fortunately the City has had a contract for several years with a disaster response company, Crowder-Gulf. Sunday they came in and started assessing damage and debris, and by the middle of the week they started hauling out

about 5000 cubic yards of debris daily. Debris was hauled to Burns Park parking lots to be stored until it could be disposed of properly. Burns Park was closed, in part, for safety reasons because these huge trucks and trailers were operating there. Once again volunteers and residents were able to fill curb lines with more wreckage. A drop off site for debris was also established for residents at the Burns Park Hospitality House parking lot.

Volunteers Flooded In

It seemed like every major denomination had out-of-state teams of volunteers that showed up to help. Chainsaw teams worked tirelessly helping residents clear downed trees and tarp damaged roofs. The Police Department had other agencies sending officers to help with patrolling the affected area. Electric Department linemen from other agencies and states replaced broken and missing poles and lines at an amazing rate. Local companies came out in droves, helping residents, feeding residents first responders and volunteers, and donating food and cleaning supplies. A volunteer check-in site and supply pick-up site was established at 1300 Pike Avenue. Code Enforcement staffed that site, unloading, sorting and reloading donated materials to help North Little Rock residents. The Central Arkansas Development Council gave out motel vouchers. Food pantries delivered food to residents who did not have transportation. Other agencies helped with recovering identification documents and legal questions. Through it all, the Emergency Operations Center tried to coordinate recovery efforts and get needed information out to our neighbors.

What About the 95% of the City Not Affected?

The first Monday following the storm, city government was open for business. Trash got picked up on the regular schedule, building permits and business licenses were issued, and police and fire calls were answered. The City was providing disaster relief and regular city services at the same time.

Where Are We Now?

FEMA and Salvation Army along with other organizations are set up in the Community Center at 2700 Willow Street in the community rooms there. Anyone affected by the storm is encouraged to go there as soon as possible and start the process to help with recovery. For Red Cross assistance call 1-800-733-2767 (1-800-RED-CROSS) Contact your insurance agent about damage and file claims with them.

We know there are a lot of clean up issues. From how root balls of fallen trees will be pulled to the curbs to fixing the ruts caused when electrical lines and poles were replaced, we have our work cut out for us as a city.

As you start to rebuild or repair, beware of scam artists masquerading as contractors. Make sure any contractor you hire has a city business license, is registered with the state, and is licensed and bonded. Call 911 and report any suspicious people aggressively pushing you to hire them for your repair needs. Take care of each other and watch out for each other. Together we truly are *North Little Rock Strong*.

Arkansas Game and Fish Commission (AGFC)

Witt Stephens Jr Central AR Nature Center--

LITTLE ROCK — The Arkansas Game and Fish Commission is again asking for help from hikers, hunters, anglers and herpetology enthusiasts to be on the lookout for a rare species found in The Natural State. Kelly Irwin, the AGFC's herpetologist, says sightings of the species anywhere in the state will help biologists conduct population surveys to determine the status of this species in Arkansas.

Chicken turtles are found in marshes, swamps and beaver ponds, primarily central, eastern and southern Arkansas. They are roughly the same size and color as red-eared sliders and river cooters, two other semi-aquatic turtles which are more common. Mature chicken turtles will have oval shells from 4 to 6 inches long with brown-olive plates featuring a faint yellow netlike pattern.

"To the untrained eye, they're easily confused for sliders," Irwin said. "But it's pretty easy to determine if you have a chicken turtle. Look at the hind quarters. If the yellow stripes are straight up and down, it's a chicken turtle."

Irwin says the AGFC has been involved in a multi-year survey process to find and record as many locations and populations of this species as possible. Chicken

turtles are listed in the Arkansas Wildlife Action Plan as a Species of Greatest Conservation Need, a status indicating downward population trends or too little data to make determinations on the overall health of the species. Successful surveys of the species can help researchers with not only information on this species, but also help focus conservation efforts in the future.
