

THE COMMISSIONING CEREMONY AND PENNANT

The commissioning ceremony marks the acceptance of a ship as a unit of the operating forces of the United States Navy. At the moment the commission pennant is broken, USS AUGUSTA (SSN710) becomes the responsibility of the Commanding Officer, who, together with the ship's officers and men, has the duty of making and keeping her ready for any service required by our nation, whether we be at peace or at war.



The commission pennant has for centuries been the symbol of a man-of-war. It is believed to date from the 17th century, when the Dutch were at war with the English. Dutch Admiral Maarten Harpertszoon Tromp hoisted a broom at his masthead to symbolize his intention to sweep the English from the sea. This gesture was answered by British Admiral William Blake, who hoisted a horsewhip indicating his intention to chastize the Dutch. The victorious British thus set the precedent for a long, narrow commissioning pennant to symbolize the original horsewhip as the distinctive symbol of a ship of war.



The modern U.S. Navy commission pennant is blue at the hoist with a union of seven white stars, and a horizontal red and white stripe at the fly.



THE HONORABLE WILLIAM S. COHEN

U.S. SENATOR FROM MAINE

PRINCIPAL SPEAKER

Senator William S. Cohen, Maine's senior senator, has been making his mark in the nation's capital since 1973 — first as a three-term congressman, then as a senator for the past four years.

Senator Cohen is chairman of two subcommittees — the Armed Services Subcommittee on Sea Power and Force Projection and the Governmental Affairs Subcommittee on Oversight of Government Management. He is also a member of the Select Committee on Intelligence and the Special Committee on Aging.

Since his election to the Senate, Cohen has been especially active in the area of arms control, co-sponsoring a "build-down" proposal that calls for scrapping two outmoded missiles for every new one built. The Senator also champions preventive health legislation as well as the reform of government procurement practices and the social security and disability compensation processes.

Early in his career, Cohen was selected as one of the Ten Outstanding Young Men in America by the National Jaycees. *Time* magazine included him as one of the country's future leaders. Recently the Noncommissioned Officers' Association presented him with the Mendel Rivers Award for his efforts on behalf of enlisted personnel in the armed forces. He also holds a number of honorary degrees.

A native of Bangor, Maine, Cohen holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Bowdoin College and an LL.B. degree from Boston University Law School (both cum laude) and was a fellow at Harvard's John F. Kennedy Institute of Politics.

While practicing law in Maine from 1965-1972, he was assistant editor of the Journal of the American Trial Lawyers' Association and an instructor at the University of Maine.

He became assistant county attorney in Penobscot County, Maine for two years, served as a Bangor city councilman for three years, a school board member for two years and was mayor of Bangor from 1971-1972.

A prolific writer and poet, the Senator is the author of Of Sons and Seasons, a book of poetry and Roll Call, a memoir of his first year in the Senate. He also co-authored a guide entitled Getting the Most Out of Washington: Using Congress to Move the Federal Bureaucracy.

VICE ADMIRAL N.R. THUNMAN, U.S. NAVY

COMMISSIONING OFFICER



Vice Admiral N.R. Thunman became the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Submarine Warfare on 1 July 1981. A native of Springfield, Illinois, Vice Admiral Thunman attended the University of Illinois and in 1950 entered the United States Naval Academy, graduating in June 1954.


Following graduation, Vice Admiral Thunman served as a Company Officer at the Naval Academy for a short period before reporting to duty aboard the USS SHELTON (DD790). In 1957, he became Commanding Officer of USS MARYSVILLE (EPCER 857). In 1959, following completion of Submarine School, he served aboard USS VOLADOR (SS490).

Vice Admiral Thunman completed Nuclear Power Training in December 1961, and was assigned to the staff of the U.S. Naval Nuclear Power School, New London, Connecticut. In 1963 he served aboard USS ROBERT E. LEE (SSBN601) (Blue) and became the Executive Officer, USS SNOOK (SSN592) in 1964. SNOOK was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation for operations in 1965. In March 1966, he reported to the Bureau of Naval Personnel, Washington, D.C. as the Assistant Program Manager for Nuclear Power Personnel.

In August 1968, Vice Admiral Thunman assumed command of USS PLUNGER (SSN595) at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii. PLUNGER was awarded the Navy Unit Commendation and Arleigh Burke Fleet Trophy under his command. In August 1971, he reported to the staff of Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet as the Assistant Chief of Staff for Training and Readiness. He reported to the staff of Commander in Chief U.S. Pacific Fleet as Senior Member of the Naval Nuclear Propulsion Examining Board in May 1972. From 1974 to 1976 he served as Commander Submarine Squadron FIFTEEN at Guam, Marianas Islands. COMSUBRON FIFTEEN was awarded the Meritorious Unit Commendation for operations during this time period.

Promoted to Rear Admiral in May 1976, he was assigned as the Assistant Chief of Naval Personnel for Officer Development and Distribution. Upon reorganization of the Office of the Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Manpower, Personnel and Training in November 1978, he became Director, Military Personnel and Training Division, Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. In May 1979, he was assigned as Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet and served in that position until assuming his present duties.

Vice Admiral Thunman's decorations include the Legion of Merit with three Gold Stars, Navy Commendation Medal with one Gold Star, Navy Expeditionary Medal, China Service Medal and the Vietnam Service Medal with three Bronze Stars. Vice Admiral Thunman is married to the former Elizabeth Chase Caldwell of Annapolis, Maryland. They have two sons, Nils Ronald Jr. and Michael Erik.



USS AUGUSTA (SSN710) is the latest addition to the LOS ANGELES Class, the Navy's newest class of nuclear powered attack submarines. They are the most advanced undersea vessels of their type in the world. Their mission is to hunt down and destroy enemy surface ships and submarines. AUGUSTA is the thirtieth vessel of the class to be commissioned.

The 360 feet, 6900 ton ships are well-equipped to accomplish that task. Faster than their predecessors and equipped with highly accurate sensors and weapons systems, they are armed with sophisticated Mark 48 torpedoes and the Harpoon guided missile. Each vessel carries a crew of 127; 13 officers and 114 enlisted men; all specialists in their field.

The USS LOS ANGELES (SSN688), for which the class is named, was commissioned on 13 November 1976.

THE CITY OF AUGUSTA



Augusta, Maine's capital city, lies on both sides of the Kennebec River at the head of its tidewater section and is a transportation, cultural and political center for 150,000 people in the capital area.

Set among wooded hills and sprinkled with numerous lakes and ponds, Augusta was first settled in 1628 as Cushnoc Trading Post. Incorporated as Augusta in 1797, the city became home of the Kennebec County Seat that same year and was later designated state capital in 1827.


Predictably, the city's largest business is government. As the capital, Augusta houses the offices of state government, regional federal agencies and most state-wide organizations. Dominating the skyline is the state house, originally designed by the noted Boston architect, Charles Bulfinch and completed in 1831.

Commercial industry in Augusta covers such diverse fields as computer manufacturing and sales, paper products, textiles, shoes, steel fabrication, meat processing, printing and data processing. Some of the firms are located in a 60-acre industrial park.

For higher education, Augusta offers a commuter branch of the University of Maine where more than 3,500 students attend day and evening classes.

The city also boasts a \$3.8-million civic center that plays host to more than 1,500 events each year. The facility's 8,000-seat main auditorium anchors a complex that serves as a convention, conference and entertainment center for more than a quarter-million people annually.

Cultural attractions, steeped in colonial history, include Fort Western, built in 1754 and the only pre-Revolution structure of its type still standing in Maine. Now a municipal museum, it is open from early spring through Labor Day and draws thousands of visitors each year. Another facility, the Maine State Museum, contains exhibits of early wildlife and historical documents.



Captain Thomas W. Turner, a native of Newport, Rhode Island, was graduated from Pennsylvania State University with a Bachelor of Science degree. He was commissioned an Ensign in the U.S. Navy through the

Following service on USS HARDHEAD (SS365), Captain Turner attended nuclear power and submarine school. In June, 1966, he reported aboard USS FRANCIS SCOTT KEY (SSBN657) in the Gold Crew, where he served as Supply Officer, Sonar Officer, Communicator and Operations Officer. Captain Turner then transferred to USS TREPANG (SSN674) as Engineer in July, 1969, remaining until February 1973. During this time the ship earned the Meritorious Unit Commendation (with star) and the Navy Expeditionary Medal; Captain

After the TREPANG assignment, Captain Turner became Material Officer on the staff of Commander, Submarine Refitting and Training Group in LaMaddalena, Sardinia. Then, back on sea duty three years later, he was Executive Officer of USS GEORGE C. MARSHALL (SSBN654), Gold Crew. During this tour, he earned the Navy Commendation Medal. Just prior to his present assignment, Captain Turner was Commanding Officer on USS SAM RAYBURN (SSBN635), Blue Crew for three years. During this tour, he earned the Meritorious Commendation Medal.

Captain Turner is married to the former Marjorie Harvey of Coatesville, Pennsylvania. The couple has two sons, Thomas and George, and reside in Gales Ferry, Connecticut.

Lieutenant Commander David O. Samples was born in Waterloo, Iowa on December 4, 1950. He is a graduate of Princess Anne High School in Virginia Beach, Virginia. He graduated from Purdue University with a Bachelor of Science degree in Aeronautical and Astronautical Engineering. He was commissioned an Ensign in the U.S. Navy through the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps program at Purdue in May, 1973.

Upon completion of nuclear power and submarine training in August 1974, Lieutenant Commander Samples was assigned aboard USS QUEENFISH (SSN651) where he served as Communicator, Electrical Officer and Main Propulsion Assistant. During this period the ship earned the Navy Unit Commendation and he was awarded the Navy Achievement Medal.

From January 1978 to December 1979, Lieutenant Commander Samples was assigned as an instructor at the Nuclear Power Training Unit at Ballston Spa, New York. During early 1980, he attended the Submarine Officer Advanced Course at New London, Connecticut.

In July 1980, Lieutenant Commander Samples reported aboard USS NEW YORK CITY (SSN696) for a three year assignment as Navigator and Operations Officer. During this time, the ship received two Meritorious Unit Commendations and the Navy Expeditionary Medal and he received the Navy Commendation Medal (with two stars). Following this tour, Lieutenant Commander Samples reported as Executive Officer, AUGUSTA (SSN710) Precommissioning Unit in August 1983.



HISTORY OF PREVIOUS U.S. NAVY SHIPS NAMED AUGUSTA

The name AUGUSTA has been carried by four previous U.S. Navy Ships. The lineage includes a 14 gun brig (1799 - 1801), which served in the Quasi-War with France, operating in the West Indies and taking five prizes; a side wheel gunboat (1861 - 1888), which operated with the South Atlantic Blockading Squadron during the Civil War; an armed yacht (SP 946) (1917 - 1918), which performed section patrol duty in the waters of the 8th Naval District during World War I; and a heavy cruiser (CA-31) (1931 - 1959), which served as one of the meeting places for President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill during the important "Atlantic Charter" conferences in the summer of 1941, and won three battle stars for her World War II service in the major amphibious landings of North Africa, Normandy and Southern France.
