North Little Rock Police Department Joins Nation-Wide Safety Network --ATLAS ONE--

The North Little Rock Police Department has joined Atlas One, a location-based public safety network that sends alerts to your smartphone when you or your loved ones are in harm's way. The free mobile application also gives the public unprecedented access to city services. Residents can download Atlas One on their iOS or Android smartphone devices.

The app allows North Little Rock Police to send geofenced push notification alerts when a public safety issue occurs nearby a user's current location, or places residents care about, such as their home, school, or office. Alerts are interactive, and can include text, photos, videos, documents, and even voice recordings. In addition, residents will have one-stop-shop access to existing North Little Rock Police Department services and resources, such as our website, social media, and contact information. Users can also explore nearby incidents, events, places, and interactive guides.

"We are extremely excited to have joined the Atlas One safety network," said North Little Rock Police Chief Patrick Thessing. "We now have the ability to send personalized geo-fenced notifications to an area as small as a building, allowing us to get the right information to the right people in real-time. This technology will save lives."

"We are thrilled to have NLRPD join the Atlas One network, and more importantly, improve transparency, communication, and information access with North Little Rock residents," said Kushyar Kasraie, CEO of Atlas One. "This brings us one step closer to our goal of creating a nation-wide public safety network that will keep our users safe, regardless of where they are."



Atlas One was built to offer residents unprecedented access to real-time information, while still respecting user privacy. "Users can be comfortable sharing their location with Atlas One knowing their data is safe," said Jamieson Johnson, Vice President of Atlas One. "Location access simply allows us to notify you if an emergency is occurring nearby. We never track historical location or share your personal data with any third parties, including the North Little Rock Police Department." Users can still be notified if alerts occur near favorite places, even if they choose not to share their location.

How it Works

- Download the free iOS or Android Atlas One App
- Tap "GET STARTED" to create your Atlas One profile
- Share your location or add favorite places that you want to track
- If an alert occurs nearby your current location, or places you track, the app will send a push notification alert
- NLRPD will also have the ability to publish incidents, events, places, and guides, and include interactive information such as directories, maps, news updates, links, and FAQ's.





Remembering Mayor Pat Hays

Twenty-nine years ago Mayor Patrick Hays and the North Little Rock City Council created the Office of Neighborhood Services. One year later he staffed that office with two employees who are still there today. The office has since expanded to four full time employees and one part time employee and now includes the City's Community Garden Program.

Mayor Hays is the longest serving Mayor in the city's history. Before that he was a State Representative and a delegate to the Arkansas Constitutional Convention of 1979-1980. While serving as Mayor, he also served as President of Metroplan

and was a trustee of the U.S. Conference of Mayors.

It was his vision of a different North Little Rock that is perhaps his greatest legacy. He changed the way the city saw neighborhood associations. Rather than seeing them as nothing more than places for people to complain, he saw them as necessary components of strong neighborhoods with members contributing to a stronger healthier city. When murders rocked the downtown and Levy neighborhoods, Mayor Hays attended meetings there to help those neighborhoods grieve and eventually form groups important in improvement efforts. He created the Department of Neighborhood Services to try to help strengthen neighborhoods.

His vision went further than individual neighborhoods. He pushed the river trail development that included the North Shore Riverwallk, the fitness trail along the river, the skate park, our riverfront RV Park, and tied Burns Park and our downtown to a trail system on both sides of the river. As part of that system the Junction Bridge and Clinton Library Bridge were saved and turned into pedestrian/bike bridges and the Big Dam Bridge was created to anchor the West end of the trail system.

Economic development included passing a county-wide sales tax for one year that funded the 80 million dollar 18,000 seat arena in our downtown. Another sun-setting sales tax funded the Dickey-Stephens baseball field and the Pat Hays Senior Center. The North Shore Riverwalk (from the Main Street Bridge to the Broadway Bridge) development has been the site of a large number of concerts and events including years of Riverfest and blues and reggae festivals.

During his administration he reestablished the North Little Rock History Commission and the Argenta Local Ordinance Historic District was formed. This was the first time in the state that a working class neighborhood was listed as a historic district and seen as being worth preserving. The local ordinance district helped control development and return houses to contributing structure status in the district. It changed the mindset of residents: they no longer just lived in old houses, they lived in contributing structures that had historic value. As a result property values skyrocketed and have kept their value.

He helped bring Local Initiatives Support Corporation to Central Arkansas, and supported the creation of the Argenta Community Development Corporation. Private and public investment spearheaded by the ACDC turned Argenta from the worst neighborhood in the city into one of the best. Mayor Hays was also instrumental in the formation of the improvement district that has helped with the redevelopment and beautification of the Main Street business corridor.

Mayor Hays continued.

Mayor Hays pursued the acceptance of North Little Rock into the Main Street, Arkansas program. Our Main Street program came up with the development plan for the Riverwalk, a streetscape for Main Street, turning Main Street and Maple Streets back into two-way traffic, and the first mention of North Little Rock as a location for the arena at one of our Main Street's planning meetings. The Smart House Way property along Riverfront Drive was turned from a contaminated brown-field site into clean property that became the site of The Vue residential development. He was also involved in the beginnings of the Rock Water development along the river in the Baring Cross neighborhood.

His cooperative relationship with the Mayor of Little Rock and the Pulaski County Judge helped reshape politics, improvements, and development on both sides of the Arkansas River.

Since his first election to Mayor in 1988, tens of thousands of people have enjoyed the results of his vision for North Little Rock. From attending events at the Arena, watching the Travs play ball, exercising on the river trail, staying in the RV park while their loved ones have received treatment at our local hospitals, eating lunch or dinner at restaurants on Main Street, attending meetings at one of our dozens of neighborhood groups, skateboarding at the skate park, enjoying the beauty of the Big Rock Quarry, to participating in events at the Pat Hays Senior Center, many may not have known he was responsible for those developments, but they enjoyed the fruits of his vision.

He will be missed. His incredible legacy lives on.
