

Preparing For The April 8, 2024 Total Solar Eclipse



On April 8, 2024 a total eclipse will occur over central Arkansas. In fact, central Arkansas will have one of the best, longest views of the totality when the Sun is completely covered by the Moon. It promises to be the biggest total eclipse in memory. It is expected to draw between one million and five million visitors to the state. With a total population of three million people, it will increase our state's population by 1/3rd to possibly doubling it. More than half of the tourists are expected to arrive in the state on Thursday, April 4, 2023 and stay until after the eclipse on Monday.

Experts are suggesting that residents treat the eclipse like a blizzard. Make sure you have enough food, water, fuel, and medicine to last a week, from Wednesday April 3, 2023 to Tuesday April 9, 2024. Expect sales at restaurants, grocery stores, service stations, and pharmacies to increase from 5 to 25 times normal. Traffic may become impassable during and immediately following the event.

The eclipse will start about 12:45 PM and last until 3 PM. The eclipse will be total from about 1:51 to 1:54 PM. During the totality the Sun will be covered by the Moon and the Sun's corona will

be visible. Total darkness will occur at 1:51 PM. The colors you see will change as the spectrum of light changes. The air will cool 12 to 15 degrees. Depth perception will decrease. Winds will pick up. You may experience vertigo, dizziness, or disorientation. Nocturnal animal's activity will increase. Pets should be kept indoors because they may become disoriented and run away. Street lights will come on. Cell phone towers may be overloaded with people taking and downloading pictures, so expect delays in cell service.

When watching the eclipse, correct glasses are required. During the totality (when the Sun is completely covered) those glasses may be put aside. Do not look at the partially covered Sun without proper eye protection!

City departments and partners are planning now for the eclipse. MEMS will be stationing ambulances in areas that may be difficult to reach if traffic comes to a standstill. The statewide Emergency Operations Center and the Pulaski County Emergency Operations Center will be on alert. All highway construction will be suspended and all lanes capable of being open will be open for traffic. Areas expecting to see the heaviest influx of tourists include Russell-ville and the Mountain View area.

This promises to be one of the most incredible astronomical events we will witness in our lifetimes. The next eclipse of this magnitude will be in 2045. With a little bit of planning and preparation you can experience it with a minimum of inconvenience.

One Reason Why We Support Our Community Gardens

A study put out in October of 2023 showed that Arkansas is the worst state in the United States when it comes to food insecurity. The study, by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, found that 16.6% of Arkansas households experienced food insecurity in 2022. The other states at the bottom of the list are Texas, Mississippi and Louisiana.

In fact, 6.5 % of our neighbors had experienced "very low food security" (ranked only behind South Carolina). "Very low food security" is defined as one or more members of a household experiencing reduced food intake and disrupted eating patterns during a year because of limited money and other resources for obtaining food. In other words, going hungry so the kids or senior citizen family member can eat.

Significant portions of North Little Rock are considered food deserts. That is defined as being more than a mile away from a fresh, nutritious food source.

Families are also facing tougher times due to cuts in the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) that had been increased during the pandemic. Our community gardens can be a source of fresh, nutritious food.

Besides supporting the community gardens in North Little Rock, our garden program has also been working on finding locations for little free food pantries throughout the city. Recycled newspaper boxes are adopted by organizations, churches, or families who volunteer to keep the boxes filled with nonperishable nutritious food. The food, or personal care items, in the boxes are available at no charge to folks who need them.

The North Little Rock Fire Department has a program called F.O.C.U.S. - Firefighters Organize Community Understanding on Safety.

This program offers new installed smoke detectors or batteries for existing ones at no charge to our citi-

For legal reasons, we also request the resident to fill out a liability form whether we install a new detector or just replace a battery. In addition, we offer a free general home inspection if requested.

Arkansas Game and Fish Commission (AGFC)

AGFC, USDA APHIS Wildlife Services Unveil New Nuisance Wildlife Hotline

An expanded partnership between the Arkansas Game and Fish Commission and the United States Department of Agriculture Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service's Wildlife Services Program should streamline the response to public reports of the occasional wild animal that poses a threat to people, livestock and property. A new nuisance wildlife hotline, 833-345-0315, is available 24 hours a day to provide guidance and assistance.

In the past, biologists and staff from all agencies involved did their best to provide relief to farmers and landowners experiencing property damage or loss to wildlife once they were contacted, getting to the right person caused unnecessary frustration.

"This new system should fix that," Robert Byrd, state director for USDA APHIS Wildlife Services, said. "You just need to call one number and any routing after that is handled on our end of things. If state staff need to handle the issue, we'll send it to the 24-hour radio room at AGFC to get them to get back in contact with you. If it's a call our people handle, we'll route it directly to our field staff and contractors."

Not only will the new system be easier for the public, it should expand the opportunities for all the agen-



cies to work together in combating nuisance wildlife issues.

"We can also share the workload between two agencies rather than one which should reduce our overall workload addressing nuisance animals," Goves said. The AGFC and Wildlife Services also note that smaller issues, such as raccoons and rodents getting into trash cans and squirrels invading someone's attic, likely still will be answered only with some advice on how to handle the situation and possible contact information for services who provide assistance for a fee.

"We simply don't have the manpower to cover all of those minor instances where the animal does not pose an immediate threat to people, livestock, crops or property," Groves said. "But we do have a lot of great information and guidance on our website."
